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Making numerical silica surfaces

Varying hydrophicity (Monte-Carlo)



Silica surfaces : various protonation-hydrophilicity

- Surface charge : pH dependent
- Punctual surface charges

Surface ion interaction





PMF : charged versus neutral points

Silanolate : charged

Siloxane : neutral



- The punctual charge on the surface favors small cations adsorption
- In contrats, big cation bind to neutral surface
- We need association constants (next slide)

Association constants:

reversal of selectivity with pH

A proper model for silica surfaces

Silica surface built from:

- Monte Carlo process,
- BKS potential
- Addition of silanols

Effective charges

Atoms Potential	Hs	Os	Si	Ос	Sic
0	+0.5	-1	+2	-1.5	+2
1	+0.5	-1	+2	-1	+2

Result:

- Defect Free surface
- Tunable hydrophilicity
- Perfect Si-O distances

- No shear plane in solvent
- ζ-potential from MD on FI or from Gouy-Chapman
- No space dependent viscosity or permittivity
- OHP does not appear: included in FI

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Conclusions



Simple description: Classical profiles can be met with

- NO VARYING PERMITTIVITY
- NO VARYING VISCOSITY
- VARYING MOBILITY

1.75 Simpler ζ -position σ^{ek} 1.50 description unit 1.25 Electric Potential / arb. 1.0 FI with varying mobility SBI 0.75 0.50 0.25 0.00 1 We find Distance to surface / arb. unit

- No stagnant layer
- No Dynamic Stern Layer
- No OHP

All Cs⁺ All Cl⁻

Non bonded Cs⁺ Non bonded Cl

- Free ions conduct, SBI do not
- Limits to Bikerman's
