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Ecological niche of *Terebralia palustris* in the mangroves of Mayotte (France, Indian Ocean)

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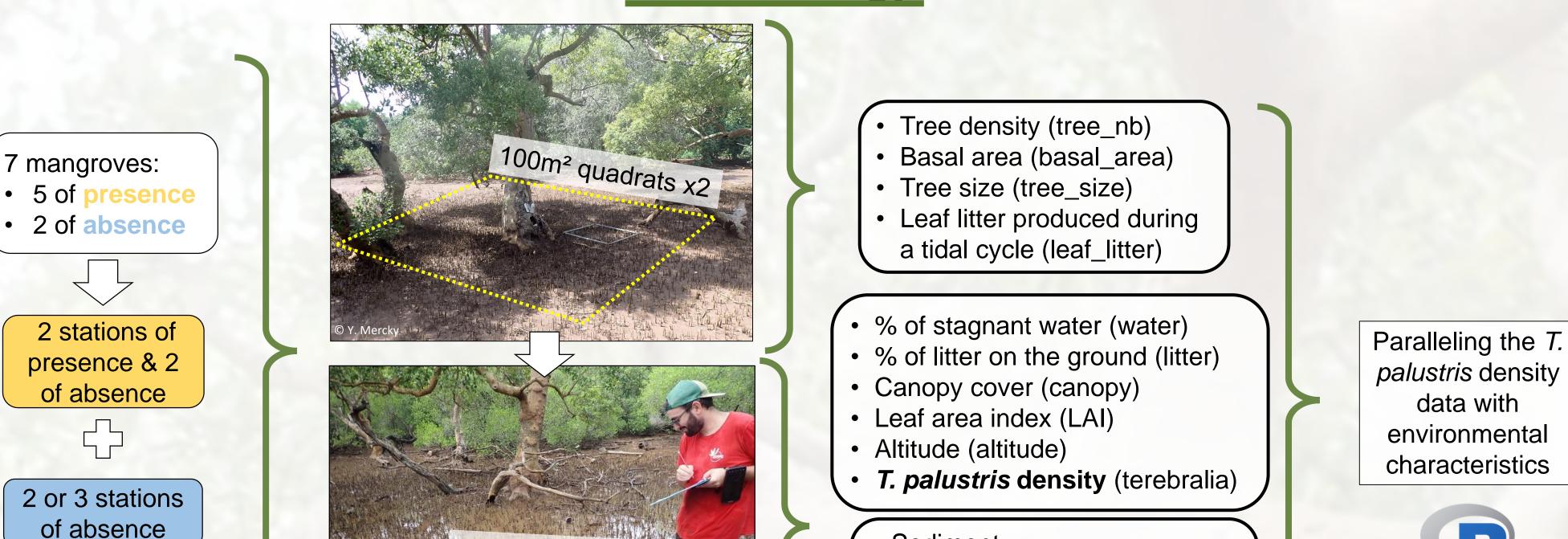
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Introduction

The epigean gastropod *Terebralia palustris* is widely distributed in the mangroves of the Indo-Pacific. It is an **engineering species** that contributes to **matter recycling** and **bioturbation**, and is a **resource for local populations** throughout its distribution (Dupont et al., *in prep*).

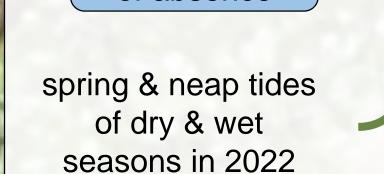
Existing knowledge on the factors explaining its **distribution** remain quite contradictory and suggests **highly context-dependent** patterns. *T. palustris* can be either limited to internal mangroves (Wells, 1980), or present on the whole mangrove (Fratini et al., 2004) depending on the location throughout its range. In Mayotte (France, Indian Ocean), *T. palustris* is **heterogeneously distributed**, being present in only 13 mangroves out of 29 on the island (Brosse et al., *in prep*). We therefore aimed to:

• Characterize the extent of T. palustris ecological niche



Methodology

- in Mayotte
- Determine what environmental variables are the most critical in conditioning the presence of *T. palustris* in Mayotte





- Sediment :
 - Median grain size (grain_size)
 - Organic matter content (OM)
 - Water content (WQ)
 - Chlorophyll a content (chl-a)



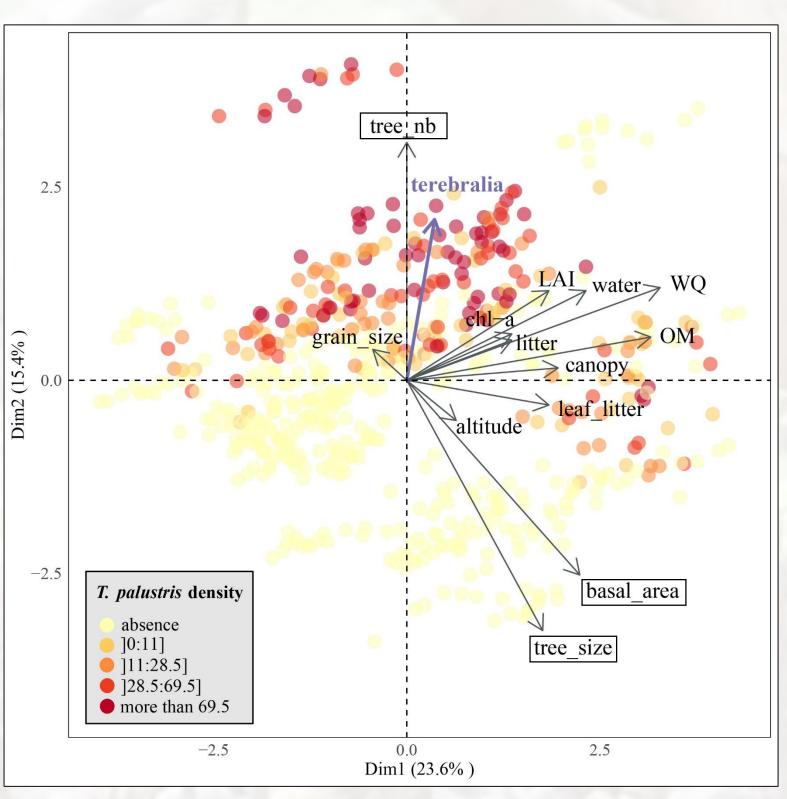


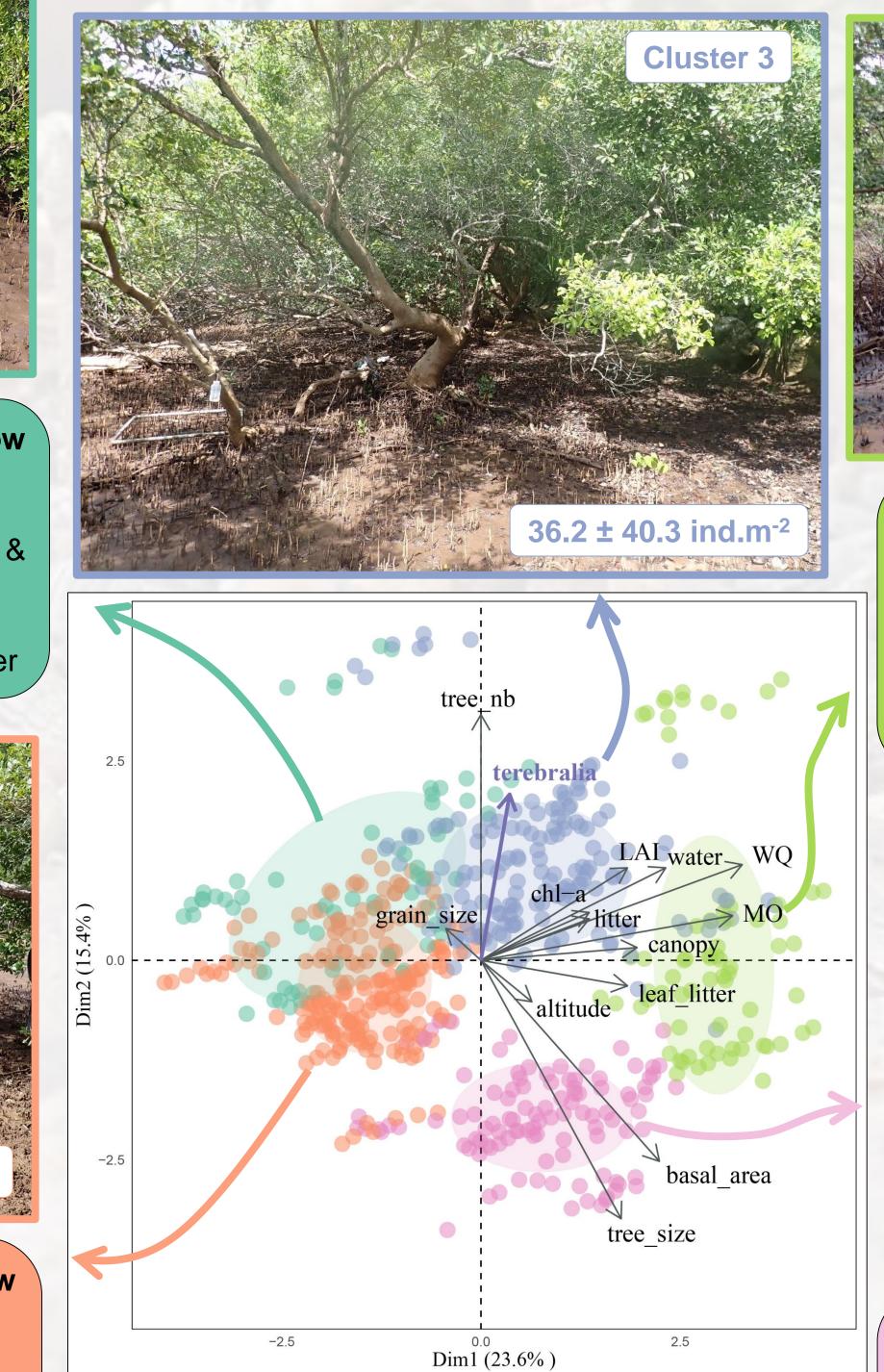
Figure 1: Principal component analysis of the environmental factors with representation of the *T. palustris* density (Abbreviations: see Methodology).

Habitat classification



- Numerous relatively small trees, low basal area & average litter production
- Higher on the shore
- Coarse sediment, low in OM, WQ & chl-a
- Closed canopy, high LAI

- Results
 - 5 habitat configurations within the internal mangrove of Mayotte



Many relatively small trees with low basal area & medium litter production

Individual T. palustris on the sediment

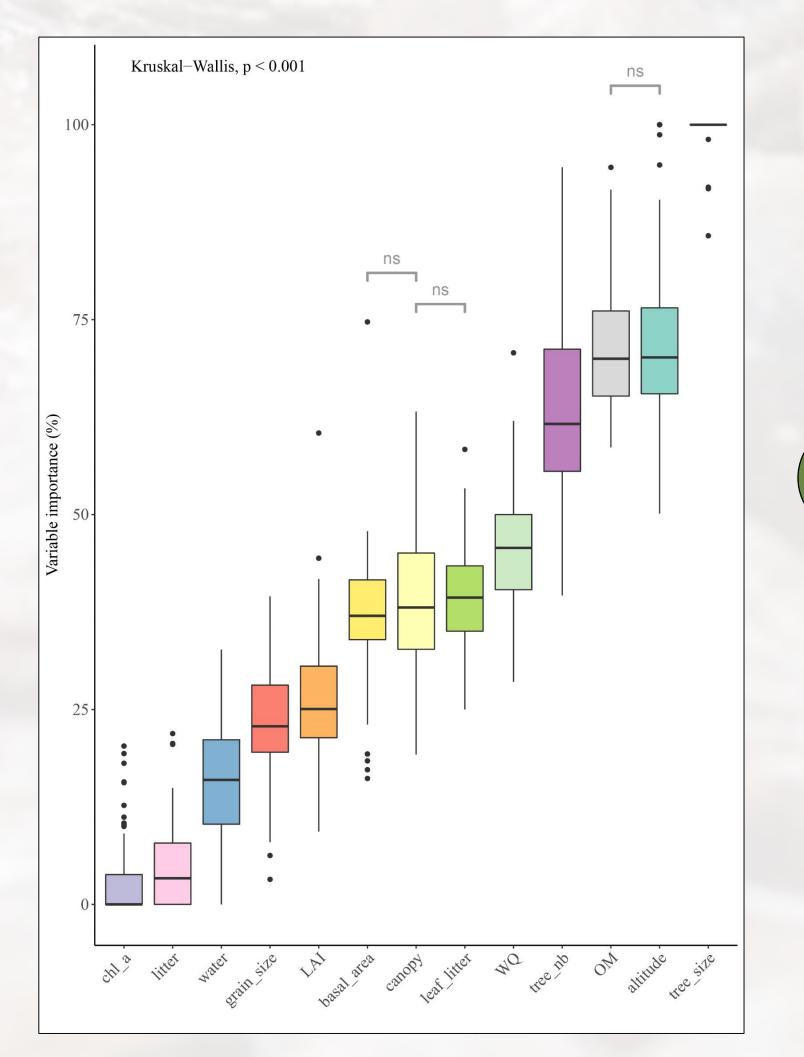
- Lower on the shore
- Fine sediment with medium OM, high WQ & rich in chl-a
- Relatively closed canopy, high LAI
- Higher % of stagnant water & ground litter

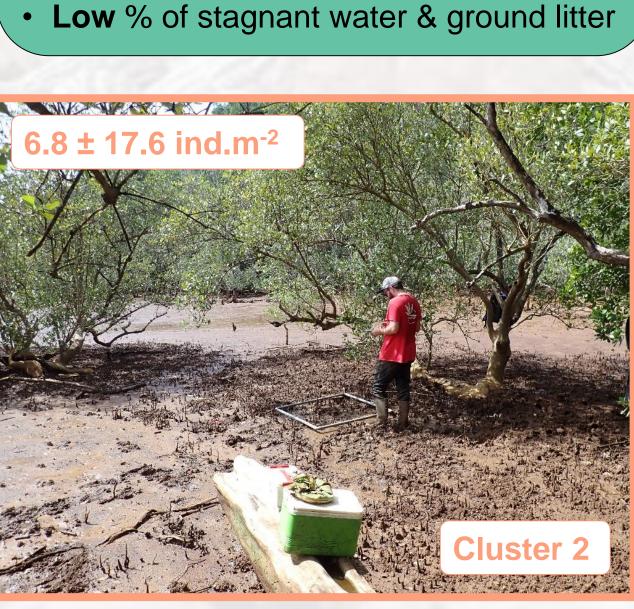




Characterization

- **No impact** of tidal cycle and season on *T. palustris* density (PERMANOVA: F=0.85, df=2, p-value < 0.001)
- Axis 2 of PCA (Fig. 1) discriminates the sites with and without *T. palustris* based on mangrove tree-related variables (nb, size, basal area)





- Few medium-sized trees with low basal area & low litter production
- Medium height on the shore
- Very fine sediment, low in OM, WQ & chl-a
- Open canopy, low LAI
- Very little % of stagnant water & ground litter

Importance of environmental variables

- **Figure 3** : Principal component analysis of the environmental factors with representation of the hierarchical classification (UPGMA, k=5) defined by their environmental structure. Clusters 2 and 4 correspond mainly to areas where *T. palustris* is absent. (Abbreviations: see Methodology).
- Few very high trees, large basal area & high litter production
- Medium height on the shore
- Rather fine sediment, medium OM, WQ, chl-a
- Rather closed canopy, but low LAI
- Low % of stagnant water & ground litter

Conclusion & perspectives

Unlike other areas in its range, T. palustris is confined to the internal mangroves in Mayotte,

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Random-forest models:

Tree size, altitude, organic matter and number of trees (Fig. 2) all play an important role in explaining the presence of *T. palustris* in large numbers. on the upper shore. Our results indicate distribution heterogeneity within the internal mangrove. **Several habitat configurations appear to be favorable** to its development. It is found where **trees** are sufficiently **numerous** $(24.5 \pm 22.2 \text{ trees by } 100 \text{ m}^2)$ and of **medium size** $(414 \pm 133 \text{ cm})$ to provide sufficient shade to prevent desiccation, but not too much to allow biofilm production and growth of surrounding trees, where the **sediment** is **rich in organic matter** $(19.0 \pm 6.2\%)$ for feeding. **Altitude** also plays a role and implies a bimodal response, as it is found **lower** $(120 \pm 40 \text{ cm})$ and **higher** $(190 \pm 30 \text{ cm})$ on the shore within internal mangrove. These different habitat configurations may be linked to the distribution of the animal at different life stages. A size distribution study was carried out in parallel and showed that a **differential size distribution** varies the realized niche during the species' life cycle, especially through **altitude** data. Young individuals are more likely to be found at the lower levels of the internal mangrove.
