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Introduction to topological strings

Topological string theory is not only a simplified model of real strings, but

- captures various corners of real string theory
- has applications to BPS black holes
- and to SUSY gauge theories
- has numerous relations to mathematics
(mirror symmetry, computation of topological invariants...)

Calabi - Yau manifolds

L2

- Calabi-Yau manifold - $2n$ real dimensional with $SU(n)$ holonomy group

(Parallel transport operators $U_\gamma = P e^{\int_\gamma \omega}$ form a group
 $\gamma = \gamma_1 \vee \gamma_2 \Rightarrow U_\gamma = U_{\gamma_1} U_{\gamma_2} \quad \gamma_1 \circ \gamma_2$
 γ -closed curve $\rightarrow U_\gamma$ -holonomy group $\rightarrow \text{Hol}(U) \subseteq O(2n)$)

This is not very practical definition. One can show:

$CY \leftrightarrow$ Kähler and Ricci flat

$$\begin{array}{ccc} \downarrow & & \uparrow \\ U(n) \text{ holonomy} & & C_1(U) = 0 \end{array}$$

$R_{\mu\nu}$ plays the role of the curvature for $U(t)$ in $U(n)$.

Inverse statement - famous theorem of Yau conjectured by Calabi: there is a unique Ricci flat metric for a Kähler manifold with $C_1=0$.

- $(1,0)$ -forms belong to $[n]$ - fund. repr. of $SU(n)$

$$\underbrace{[n] \otimes \cdots \otimes [n]}_{n \text{ times}} = [1] \oplus \cdots \oplus [n] \Rightarrow \exists \text{ covariantly constant } \Omega \in H^{n,0}(U)$$

In fact: $\Omega = 0 \Leftrightarrow \nabla \Omega = 0 \Leftrightarrow \Omega$ is nowhere vanishing

- CY is characterized by 2 compatible structures:

ω
Kähler str.

gives the metric $g(u,v) = \omega(u, \bar{v})$

Compatibility: $d\omega = d\bar{\omega} = 0$

$$\Omega \wedge \omega = 0, \quad \Omega \wedge \bar{\omega} \sim \underbrace{\omega \wedge \dots \wedge \omega}_n$$

Ω
complex str.

determines holomorphic coordinates $\Omega \sim dz^1 \wedge \dots \wedge z^n$

- Examples

$n=1: T^2$ (since curvature must vanish)

$n=2: K3$ - the only 4d CY, realized as $x^4 + y^4 + z^4 + w^4 = 0$ in \mathbb{CP}^3

$n=3$: most interesting case

Hodge numbers

- On complex manifolds $d = \partial + \bar{\partial}$, $\partial^2 = \bar{\partial}^2 = 0$

Dolbeault cohomology

$$H_{\bar{\partial}}^{p,q} = \frac{\text{Ker}(\bar{\partial}(\Lambda^{(p,q)}))}{\text{Im}(\bar{\partial}(\Lambda^{(p,q-1)}))} = \frac{\bar{\partial}\text{-closed}}{\bar{\partial}\text{-exact}}$$

$h^{p,q} = \dim H_{\bar{\partial}}^{p,q}$ - Hodge number

= {harmonic forms of $\Delta_{\bar{\partial}} = \bar{\partial}\bar{\partial}^+ + \bar{\partial}^+\bar{\partial}$ }

For Kähler manifolds $\Delta_{\bar{\partial}} = \Delta_{\partial} = \frac{1}{2} \Delta d$

$$\Rightarrow H_{\bar{\partial}}^{p,q} = H_{\partial}^{p,q} \equiv H^{p,q}$$

$$H^k = \bigoplus_{p+q=k} H^{p,q}, \quad b_k = \sum_{p=0}^k h^{p,k-p}$$

$$h^{p,q} = h^{q,p} = h^{n-p, n-q}$$

- For CY manifolds

$$h^{n,0} = h^{0,n} = 1 \quad \leftarrow \exists! \Omega$$

$$h^{0,0} = h^{n,n} = 1 \quad \leftarrow \text{for any complex manifold}$$

$$h^{k,0} = h^{0,k} = 0 \quad \text{for } 1 \leq k \leq n-1$$

- Hodge diamond for CY with $n=3$

$$\begin{array}{ccccccc} & & & & & & \\ & & 0 & & 0 & & \\ & & \diagup & & \diagdown & & \\ & 0 & & h^{1,1} & & 0 & \\ & \diagup & & \diagdown & & \diagup & \\ 1 & & h^{2,1} & & h^{1,2} & & 1 \\ & \diagdown & & \diagup & & \diagdown & \\ & 0 & & h^{1,1} & & 0 & \\ & \diagup & & \diagdown & & \diagup & \\ & 0 & & 0 & & 0 & \\ & & \diagup & & \diagdown & & \\ & & 1 & & 0 & & \end{array}$$

- only 2 unfixed numbers: $h^{2,1}, h^{1,1}$
- Euler characteristic $\chi = 2(h^{1,1} - h^{2,1})$
- Symmetry $h^{1,1} \leftrightarrow h^{2,1}$ - mirror symmetry

for any CY there is its mirror image
(except rigid CYs with $h^{2,1}=0$)

Moduli spaces of CY

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Let us fix topology of a CY

What are 'its' possible continuous deformations?

→ Moduli space

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deformations of Kähler str. \times deformations of complex str.

Kähler moduli space M_K

For a fixed complex structure, $\mathcal{M}_k \subset H^{1,2}(M)$

such that $\int \omega^k > 0$ for all $2k$ -cycles $\gamma_{2k}, k=1, \dots, n$

$\Rightarrow M_K - \text{K\"ahler cone}$

locally these conditions are irrelevant, so

$$T(\mathcal{M}_k) = H^{1,1}(\mathcal{M})$$

space of infinitesimal
deformations

Complex structure moduli space M_c

Complex structure is determined by $S = f(z) dz^1 \wedge dz^2 \wedge dz^3$

Change of compl. str. \leftrightarrow change of $z^i \rightarrow z^i + \xi_j z^j$

\Rightarrow deformations are classified by (2,1)-forms

\Rightarrow locally $M_C \sim H^{2,1}(\mu)$

On both moduli spaces one can define natural metrics.

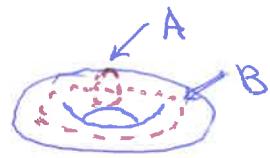
Metric on \mathcal{M}_C

- Let (A^a, B_λ) - a canonical basis in $H_3(M)$
 $a=0, \dots, h^{2,1}$



$$A^a \wedge A^\Sigma = B_\lambda \wedge B_\Sigma = 0$$

$$A^a \wedge B_\Sigma = S_\Sigma^a$$



Let $(\alpha_n, \beta^\lambda) \in H^3$ be a dual basis



$$\int_A \alpha_\Sigma = +S_\Sigma^a, \int_{B_\lambda} \beta^\Sigma = -S_\lambda^\Sigma, \int_B \alpha_\Sigma = \int_A \beta^\Sigma = 0$$

(The basis can be found by defining symplectic structure on H^3 : $\{\alpha, \beta\} = \int d\alpha \wedge \beta$ and bringing it to the canonical Darboux form.)

- In this basis the complex structure of CY is captured by $2h^{2,1}+2$ parameters $\mathcal{L} = X^a \alpha_a - F_\lambda \beta^\lambda$ or $\begin{cases} X^a = \int_A \alpha_a \\ F_\lambda = \int_{B_\lambda} \beta^\lambda \end{cases}$

But there are only $h^{2,1}$ independent parameters
 \rightarrow there must be relations between X^a and F_λ

$$0 = \int_M \mathcal{L} \wedge \frac{\partial \mathcal{L}}{\partial X^a} = \int_M (X^a \alpha_\Sigma - F_\lambda \beta^\Sigma) \wedge (\alpha_a - \partial_X F_\Sigma \beta^\Sigma)$$

$$\Downarrow \text{Riemann bilinear} \quad \int_M \alpha \wedge \beta = \sum_n \left(\int_{A^n} \alpha \right) \beta - \sum_n \left(\int_{B_n} \alpha \right) \beta$$

F-prepotential

X^a - homogeneous coordinates

$z^a = X^a / X^0$ - projective coordinates on \mathcal{M}_C

$$F_\lambda = X^a \partial_{X^a} F_\Sigma \quad \text{identity}$$

$$F_\lambda = \frac{1}{2} \partial_{X^a} (X^a F_\Sigma) \quad \text{on } F_\lambda = \partial_X F \text{ where } F = \frac{1}{2} X^a F_\lambda$$

F-homogeneous of degree 2.

- The metric on \mathcal{M}_C is defined to be Kähler with

$$K = -\log \left(i \int_M \mathcal{L} \wedge \bar{\mathcal{L}} \right) \Rightarrow K = -\log [i(X^a F_\lambda - X^\lambda F_\lambda)]$$

\rightarrow determined by a single holomorphic function

$\rightarrow \mathcal{M}_C$ - (projective or local) special Kähler manifold

Metric on M_K

- Denote the Kähler 2-form by Ω
 $\rightarrow \Omega_m^n = g^{m\bar{n}} \Omega_{m\bar{n}}$ - complex structure

Basis in even cohomology:

$$\omega_i \in H^2(M), \quad \bar{\omega}_i^* \in H^4(M), \quad \omega_v \in H^6(M)$$

volume form

- In this basis

$\Omega = t^i \omega_i$, $t^i \in \mathbb{R}$ - coordinates on M_K

let us complexify M_K : $t^i \rightarrow z^i \in \mathbb{C}$

In string theory this happens due to the B-field

$$\Omega \rightarrow (B + i\Omega) = (b^i + i t^i) \omega_i = v^i \omega_i$$

- The metric on M_K is defined to be Hermitian
with $g_{i\bar{j}} = \frac{1}{K} \int_M \omega_i \wedge \omega_j$ (i.e. $g_{i\bar{j}} = g_{\bar{i}\bar{j}} = 0$)

notations

$$K_i = \partial_i K = \frac{1}{2} \int_M \omega_i \wedge \Omega \wedge \Omega$$

$$R_{i\bar{j}} = \partial_i \partial_{\bar{j}} K = \int_M \omega_i \wedge \omega_{\bar{j}} \wedge \Omega \wedge \Omega$$

$$\partial_i \partial_{\bar{j}} \partial_K K = R_{i\bar{j}K}$$

One can prove that

$$\star \omega_i = -(\delta_{i\bar{j}} \omega_{\bar{j}} - \frac{R_i}{2K} \Omega \wedge \Omega)$$

$$\downarrow \\ g_{i\bar{j}} = -\left(\frac{R_{i\bar{j}}}{K} - \frac{R_i R_{\bar{j}}}{K^2} \right) = -\partial_i \partial_{\bar{j}} \log(K) = \partial_{z^i} \partial_{\bar{z}^j} K$$

where $K = -\log 8R$ - Kähler potential

Moreover

$$K = -\log [i(\bar{x}^I F_I - x^I \bar{F}_I)] \Big|_{\substack{x^I = z^i \\ x^0 = 1}} \quad I = 0, \dots, h^{1,1}$$

$$\text{where } F = -\frac{1}{6x^0} R_{i\bar{j}k} x^i x^j x^k$$

$\rightarrow M_K$ - projective special Kähler manifold
with prepotential F

$$\omega_i \wedge \bar{\omega}^j = \delta_{i\bar{j}} \omega_{\bar{0}}$$

$$\omega_i \wedge \omega_j = R_{i\bar{j}k} \omega^k$$

triple intersection numbers

$$R_{ijk} = \int_M \omega_i \wedge \omega_j \wedge \omega_k$$

Cohomological field theories

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- We are interested in topological theories which do not depend either on metric or some background structures such as complex structure

Note: if the topological theory is invariant under general coordinate transformations, then $\langle O_1(x_1) \dots O_n(x_n) \rangle$ do not depend on x_i (since trans-n of x_i is compensated by tr. of $g_{\mu\nu}$)

- There are 2 types of topological theories

- Schwarz-type

S and O_i are independent of the metric

Example: Chern-Simons theory $S = \int \text{Tr}(A \wedge dA - \frac{2}{3} A \wedge A \wedge A)$

- Witten-type or cohomological

Let \exists fermionic operator Q such that it generates a symmetry and

i) nilpotence $Q^2 = 0$

ii) physical operators are Q -closed: $[Q, O_i] = 0$

iii) Q -symmetry is not spontaneously broken, i.e. $Q|\psi\rangle_{\text{phys}} = 0$

$$\Rightarrow O_i \simeq O_i + \{Q, A_i\}$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{physical operators} \leftrightarrow Q\text{-cohomology}$$

iv) Energy-momentum tensor is Q -exact: $T_{ab} = \frac{\delta S}{\delta h^{ab}} = \{Q, G_{ab}\}$

the most non-trivial condition, which ensures that (provided O_i are metric independent) correlation functions are invariant under deformations $\sum \langle O_1(x_1) \dots O_n(x_n) \rangle = 0$

→ This generalizes to any structure appearing only in Q -exact terms.

Example: $L = \{Q, \psi\} \Rightarrow$ independence of $t_i \Rightarrow$ classical approximation is exact.

- Families of operators

i) $O^{(0)}$ -scalar physical operator. Use ii) $\Rightarrow P_a = \{Q, G_{ab}\}$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{d}{dx^a} O^{(0)} = \{[P_a, O^{(0)}]\} = i[\{Q, G_{ab}\}, O^{(0)}] = \pm i[\{G_{ab}, O^{(0)}\}, Q] - i[\{Q, O^{(0)}\}, G_{ab}] \\ = \{Q, O^{(1)}\} \text{ where } O^{(1)} = i[\{G_{ab}, O^{(0)}\}] \Rightarrow dO^{(0)} = \{Q, O^{(1)}\}$$

Similarly $dO^{(k)} = \{Q, O^{(k+1)}\}$, $0 \leq k < n$, $dO^{(n)} = 0$, $n = \dim M$

$\Rightarrow \int \frac{\partial O^{(p)}}{\partial p} - \text{physical operator (non-local)} \text{ and } \int O^{(n)}$ can be added to the action

Topological twist

- Consider a 2d non-linear \mathbb{Q} -model with $N=(2,2)$ SUSY
(In 2d, the Lorentz group is $SO(2) = U(1) \Rightarrow S=\frac{t}{2}$ -reducible rep.)

$$S = \int d^2 z d^4 \Theta K(\Phi^i, \bar{\Phi}^i) = - \int d^2 z \frac{\partial K}{\partial \varphi^i \partial \bar{\varphi}^j} \partial^a \varphi^i \partial_a \bar{\varphi}^j + \text{fermions}$$

$$\Phi^i - \text{chiral } N=2 \text{ super field } (\bar{\partial}_+ \Phi^i = 0, \bar{\partial}_+ = -\frac{\partial}{\partial \theta^\pm} + i \theta^\pm \partial_\pm \\ \bar{\psi}^i + \psi^i_- \theta^+ + \psi^i_+ \theta^- + F \theta^+ \theta^- \\ Q_\pm = \partial_\pm \theta^\pm + i \bar{\theta}^\pm \partial_\pm)$$

$K(\varphi, \bar{\varphi})$ - Kähler potential on target space (required by $(2,2)$ SUSY)

- Symmetry algebra

$$\{Q_\pm, \bar{Q}_\pm\} = -2i \partial_\pm = P \pm H$$

M-Lorentz generator
 \pm - its eigenspaces
 $(Q_\pm)^* = \bar{Q}_-$

$$[M, Q_\pm] = \pm Q_\pm, [M, \bar{Q}_\pm] = \pm \bar{Q}_\pm, [M, H] = 2P, [M, 2P] = 2H$$

vector and axial: $[V, Q_\pm] = Q_\pm, [V, \bar{Q}_\pm] = -\bar{Q}_\pm$

R-symmetries: $[A, Q_\pm] = \pm Q_\pm, [A, \bar{Q}_\pm] = \mp \bar{Q}_\pm$

$$\Rightarrow Q_A = \bar{Q}_+ + Q_-, \{Q_A, Q_+ - \bar{Q}_-\} = 2M, \{Q_A, Q_+ + \bar{Q}_-\} = 2P, Q_A^2 = 0$$

$$Q_B = \bar{Q}_+ + \bar{Q}_-, \{Q_B, Q_+ - Q_-\} = 2H, \{Q_B, Q_+ + Q_-\} = 2P, Q_B^2 = 0$$

$\rightarrow Q_{A/B}$ satisfy all requirements (nilpotence and exactness of T_{ab})

But in the presence of hol. SUSY requires the existence of covariantly constant spinor - does not exist on arbitrary Riemann surface.

- Idea: change transformation properties so that Q be a scalar \leftarrow achieved by twisting
declare a new Lorentz generator

$$1) M_A = M + V$$

$$2) M_B = M + A$$

$$[M, Q_+] = 2Q_+, [M, Q_-] = [M, \bar{Q}_+] = 0, [M, \bar{Q}_-] = -2\bar{Q}_- \quad [M_B, Q_\pm] = \pm 2Q_\pm, [M_B, \bar{Q}_\pm] = 0$$



Q_A - scalar

- The twist removes conformal anomaly!

$$[L_m, L_n] = (m-n)L_{m+n} + \frac{c}{12}m(m^2-1)\delta_{mn}$$

$$[L_m, Y_n] = -n Y_{m+n}$$

$$[Y_m, Y_n] = \frac{c}{3}m\delta_{m+n}$$

$$\Rightarrow \tilde{T} = T + \frac{1}{2}\delta Y \Rightarrow \bar{\partial} \tilde{T} = 0 \text{ and } \tilde{L}_m = L_m - \frac{1}{2}(m+1)Y_m \Rightarrow [\tilde{L}_m, \tilde{L}_n] = (m-n)\tilde{L}_{m+n}$$

\rightarrow no restriction on the dimension of space (just here)

$M = 2\pi i(L_0 - \bar{L}_0)$
where $\bar{\partial} Y = 0$ conserved current (like V or A)

A-model

- Fermions after twisting

$$\psi_z^i \rightarrow \psi_z^i \in \Lambda^{(0,0)} \otimes \psi^*(T^{(0,0)}\mathcal{M}), \quad \psi_{\bar{z}}^i \rightarrow \psi_{\bar{z}}^i \in \psi^*(T^{(0,0)}\mathcal{M}) \quad + \text{compl. conj.}$$

↑ pull back of $\varphi: \Sigma \rightarrow \mathcal{M}$

The action

$$S = -2t \int d^2z [g_{i\bar{j}} \partial_z \varphi^i \partial_{\bar{z}} \bar{\varphi}^j + g_{\bar{i}\bar{j}} \partial_{\bar{z}} \varphi^i \partial_z \bar{\varphi}^j + i g_{i\bar{j}} \psi_z^i \nabla_z \bar{\psi}_{\bar{j}} + i g_{\bar{i}\bar{j}} \psi_{\bar{z}}^j \nabla_{\bar{z}} \bar{\psi}_i]$$

$$+ \frac{t}{2} R_{i\bar{j}k\bar{l}} \psi_z^i \psi_{\bar{z}}^j \chi^k \bar{\chi}^l = -t \int d^2z [i \{Q_A, \psi\} - 2g_{i\bar{j}} (\partial_z \varphi^i \partial_{\bar{z}} \bar{\varphi}^j - \partial_{\bar{z}} \varphi^i \partial_z \bar{\varphi}^j)]$$

where $\psi = g_{i\bar{j}} (\psi_z^i \partial_z \bar{\varphi}^j + \partial_{\bar{z}} \varphi^i \psi_{\bar{z}}^j)$

Second term = $t \int_{\Sigma} \psi^*(\omega) = t \int_{\Sigma} \omega \leftarrow \text{K\"ahler form on } \mathcal{M}$
 $\downarrow d\omega = 0$

→ dependence on the metric h^{ab}
 only through the Q_A -exact term

depends only on homology
 classes of $\varphi(\Sigma)$

topological theory on Σ

- Dependence on complex structure is also only in the Q_A -exact term → no dependence on it in correlation functions
 - Dependence on t : exact term and $i \int_{\Sigma} \omega$
 → in the fixed homological class, the classical limit $t \rightarrow 0$ is exact
 → path integral localizes on Q_A -exact configurations
 $(\int Q: \theta \rightarrow \theta + \varepsilon \Rightarrow \int d\theta e^{-S} = 0 \text{ except fixed points } Q\theta = 0)$
- In our case $\{Q_A, \varphi^i\} = \dot{\varphi}^i$, $\{Q_A, \chi^i\} = 0$, $\{Q_A, \psi_z^i\} = i(\bar{\partial} \varphi^i - \varphi^i \Gamma_{jk}^i \psi_{\bar{z}}^j)$
 $\Rightarrow \partial_{\bar{z}} \varphi^i = \partial_z \bar{\varphi}^i = 0 \rightarrow \underline{\varphi \text{-holomorphic map}}$

$$\text{A-model} \rightarrow \sum_{\beta \in H_2^+(M)} e^{-t \omega \cdot \beta} \int_{\text{moduli space of holomorphic maps } \Sigma \rightarrow M} \sum_{\alpha} \dots$$

- Physical operators

$$O_\alpha = \alpha_i \cdots i \varphi_j \cdots j \bar{\varphi}_k (\psi) \psi^i \cdots \psi^p \bar{\psi}^q \cdots \bar{\psi}^r \quad (\psi's \text{ have indices on } \Sigma)$$

$$\text{From the action of } Q_A: \varphi^i \leftrightarrow \partial \varphi^i \Rightarrow \underline{\{Q_A, O_\alpha\} = -O_{d\alpha}}$$

Thus, physical operators \leftrightarrow de Rham cohomology

In particular, $\alpha \in \Lambda^{(0,1)} \rightarrow O_\alpha$ - deformation of K\"ahler str.

A model \leftrightarrow theory of K\"ahler structures

B-model

- Fermions after twisting

$$\psi_{\pm}^i \rightarrow g_{\pm}^i \in \Lambda^{(1,0)} \otimes \varphi^*(T^{(1,0)}\mathcal{M}), \quad \bar{\psi}_{\pm}^i \rightarrow \eta^{\mp}, \quad \theta_i \in \varphi^*(T^{(0,1)}\mathcal{M})$$

g_{\pm}^i

The action

$$\begin{aligned} S = & -t \int d^2z [2g_{ij}\partial_z \varphi^i \partial_{\bar{z}} \bar{\varphi}^j + 2g_{\bar{i}\bar{j}}\partial_{\bar{z}} \varphi^i \partial_z \bar{\varphi}^j + i g_{ij} \eta^{\mp} (\nabla_{\bar{z}} g_{\pm}^i + \nabla_z g_{\pm}^i) \\ & + i \theta_i (\nabla_{\bar{z}} g_{\pm}^i - \nabla_z g_{\pm}^i) + \frac{1}{2} R_{ijk}{}^e g_{\pm}^i g_{\pm}^k \eta^{\mp} \theta_e] = \\ = & -t \int d^2z [i \{Q_B, \psi\} + i \theta_i (\nabla_{\bar{z}} g_{\pm}^i - \nabla_z g_{\pm}^i) + \frac{1}{2} R_{ijk}{}^e g_{\pm}^i g_{\pm}^k \eta^{\mp} \theta_e] \end{aligned}$$

where $\Psi = g_{ij}(\varphi_{\pm}^i \partial_z \bar{\varphi}^j + \varphi_{\pm}^j \partial_z \bar{\varphi}^i)$

antisym-c in (z, \bar{z})

\downarrow
differential form

- This implies (up to Q_B -exact term):

- 1) no dependence on metric \rightarrow topological
- 2) no dependence on Kähler structure (can be shown)
- 3) dependence on t can be absorbed into θ_i
 \rightarrow localization on $\partial_z \varphi^i = \partial_{\bar{z}} \varphi^i = 0 \Rightarrow \varphi^i = \text{const}$

$$\{Q_B, \varphi^i\} = \{Q_B, \theta_i\} = \{Q_B, \eta^{\mp}\} = 0 \quad \uparrow$$

$$\{Q_B, \bar{\varphi}^i\} = -\eta^{\mp}, \quad \{Q_B, \varphi_{\pm}^i\} = -\partial_z \varphi^i \quad \uparrow$$

\downarrow
 $\varphi(z) = \text{point}$

\downarrow
B-model - local field theory
on \mathcal{M}

Physical operators

$$O_a = a_{\bar{z}_1} \cdots \bar{z}_{i_1} \cdots \bar{z}_p \eta^{\bar{i}_1} \cdots \eta^{\bar{i}_q} \theta_{j_1} \cdots \theta_{j_p}$$

From the action of Q_B : $\eta^{\mp} \leftrightarrow \bar{\partial} \varphi^{\mp}$ $\Rightarrow \{Q_B, O_a\} = -\partial_{\bar{z}a}$
 $\theta_i \leftrightarrow \frac{\partial}{\partial \varphi^i}$

Thus, physical operators \leftrightarrow $(0, q)$ cohomologies
valued in $\Lambda^q(T^{(1,0)}\mathcal{M})$

In particular, $a \in \Lambda^{(0,1)} \otimes T^{(1,0)}\mathcal{M} \rightarrow O_a$ - deformation of
complex structure
($R_{ijk}{}^k \in H^{2,1}$)

B-model \leftrightarrow theory of complex structures

Anomalies

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Problem: the axial $U(1)$ symmetry can be anomalous

The anomaly arises due to zero modes of the Dirac operator
→ the measure in the path integral has a non-zero

charge $2K = 2(\dim \text{Ker } \not{D}_+ - \dim \text{Ker } \not{D}_-)$

This is an index independent of continuous def.-ns.

Can be evaluated by Atiyah-Singer theorem

- In the original $N=(2,2)$ σ -model

$$K = \int_{\Sigma} c_1(M) \Rightarrow \text{anomaly disappears}$$

only on $M - CY$

- A-model : $K = d(1-g) + \int_{\Sigma} c_1(M)$

$$d = \dim_{\mathbb{R}} M$$

g - genus of Σ

Even for $M - CY$, it seems that

the model exists only on torus ($g=1$)

(and on sphere ~~for~~ correlation functions of
operators of charge $-2d \rightarrow 2d$ -forms, i.e. top-forms)

Topological strings and anomaly cancellation

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- In string theory we have to integrate over w.s. metrics

Beltrami differentials

- The measure on the moduli space M_g

Correlation functions

- Why $\deg O_k = 2$?

For such choice the corresponding integrated operator $\int O_k^{(2)}$ has vanishing charge and can be added \sum to the action.

$$\Rightarrow \text{Partition function } Z_g[t] = \int \mathcal{D} \dots e^{-S_A + \sum_k t^k \int O_k^{(2)}}$$

$$\text{Correlation functions } \left. \frac{\delta^n}{\delta t^{k_1} \dots \delta t^{k_n}} Z_g[t] \right|_{t=0}$$

For $g=0/1$ one should insert 3/1 unintegrated operators

- Example for $g=0$:

- F_g - non-trivial generalizations of F_0 containing information about more general topological invariants ($d_\beta^{(g)}, N_\beta^{(g)}, DT \dots$)
- In the B-model, F_0 - holomorphic prepotential on $\mathcal{M}_c(CY)$
 (no quantum corrections)

F-terms

- F_0 determines second derivatives terms in the effective action obtained by compactifying string theory (type IIA or IIB) on M. (CY moduli \rightarrow fields)
What is the role of F_g ?
They determine a class of terms with higher deriv-s.
- 4d $N=2$ SUGRA can be formulated off-shell using superconformal formalism

$$S_{\text{eff}} = \int d^4x d^4\Theta d^4\bar{\Theta} R(\Phi, \bar{\Phi}) + \int d^4x d^4\Theta W(\Phi, W^2)$$

where W^2 - scalar chiral superfield
 constructed from Weyl superfield W

$$W_{\mu\nu}(x, \Theta) = F_{\mu\nu} - \frac{1}{2} R_{\mu\nu\alpha\beta} \Sigma_{\alpha\beta} \exp \Theta^2 \alpha_i^\alpha \partial^\beta \Phi + \dots$$

\rightarrow graviphoton field-strength

$$W(\Phi, W^2) = \sum_{g=0} W^{2g} F_g(\Phi)$$

- The claim: F_g - free energy of A/B model
for compactification of type IIA/IIB strings

The terms determined by F_g :

$$\int d^4x F_g(x) [R^2 F^{2(g-1)} + 2(g-1)(RF)^2 F^{2(g-2)}]$$

gives scattering of g gravitons and $2(g-1)$ graviphotons

- Mirror symmetry

A-model on CY	=	B-model on \tilde{CY}
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Holomorphic anomaly

- We want to have a real action $\rightarrow \sum_k (t^k \int_{\Sigma_B} O^{(2)}_k + \bar{t}^k \int_{\Sigma_B} \bar{O}^{(2)}_k)$
But is $\bar{O}^{(2)}$ physical?

Consider the B-model where $\{Q_B, Q_+ - Q_-\} = 2H \Rightarrow Q_2 \sim Q_+$

$$\{Q_B, Q_+ + Q_-\} = 2P \Rightarrow Q_2 \sim Q_-$$

$$\begin{aligned} \bar{O}_{2\bar{2}}^{(2)} &= i \{Q_2, O_{\bar{2}}^{(1)}\} = - \{Q_2, [Q_2, O^{(0)}]\} \sim - \{\bar{Q}_+, [\bar{Q}_-, \bar{O}^{(0)}]\} = \\ &= \frac{1}{2} \{ \bar{Q}_+ + \bar{Q}_-, [\bar{Q}_- - \bar{Q}_+, \bar{O}^{(0)}] \} \Rightarrow \bar{O}^{(2)} - Q_B\text{-exact} \end{aligned}$$

- $F_g = \langle e^{\sum_k (t^k \int_{\Sigma_B} O^{(2)}_k + \bar{t}^k \int_{\Sigma_B} \bar{O}^{(2)}_k)} \rangle$ seems to be independent of t^k
i.e. holomorphic

The naive argument fails

because of the non-trivial measure on the moduli space.

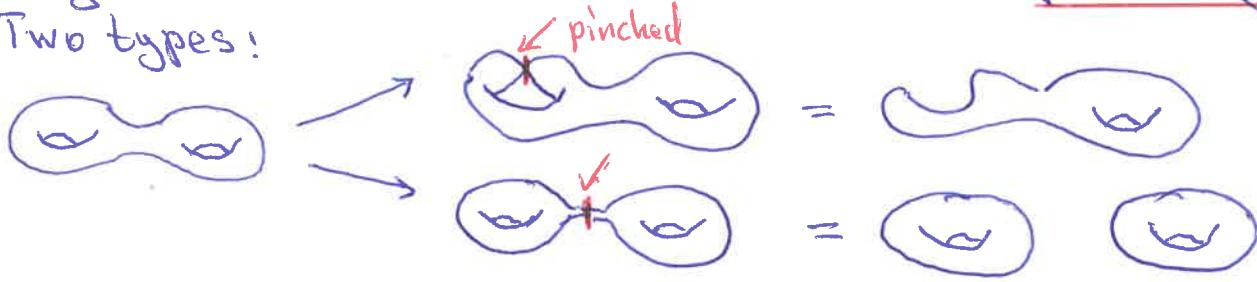
Due to $\{Q_B, Q_2\} = T \cdot \mu_2 \sim \frac{\partial S}{\partial m^2}$, one gets the total derivative:

$$\frac{\partial F_g}{\partial t^K} \sim \sum_{Mg} \prod_{k=1}^{3g-3} dm^k d\bar{m}^k \left(\sum_{\beta} \frac{\partial}{\partial m^{\beta}} \left\langle (\prod_{j \in \beta} S \mu_j) (\prod_{j \in \beta} \bar{S} \bar{\mu}_j) \int \bar{O}^{(2)}_k \right\rangle + \text{c.c.} \right)$$

But this is not zero because Mg has boundaries!

equation of holomorphic anomaly

$$\bullet \quad Z_{\text{top}} = \exp \left[\sum_{g=0}^{\infty} \lambda^{2g-2} F_g \right] \Rightarrow \left[\partial_{\bar{K}} - \lambda^2 C_{\bar{m}m\bar{n}n} e^{2K} g^{\bar{m}\bar{m}} g^{\bar{n}n} D_m D_n \right] Z_{\text{top}} = 0$$

The equation allows to find F_g up to "holomorphic ambiguity" which can be fixed by a finite number of conditions.

Background independence

- The holomorphic anomaly can be interpreted as dependence on "background complex structure":
 - take t^k and \bar{t}^k independent
 - t^k determines \mathcal{Q}_0 , while variations δt^k around $t^k = (\bar{t}^k)^*$ generate correlators
 - anomaly implies dependence on \mathcal{Q}_0
- Idea: find a new interpretation for the same system

Z_{top} - wave function

Choice of \mathcal{Q}_0 - choice of polarization

Background independence holds for the state,
but not for its representation!

$$Z_{\text{top}} = \Psi_{\text{top}}(x) = \langle \text{top} | x \rangle_{\mathcal{Q}_0} \quad x \in \mathbb{C}^n$$

back.ind. background

- Realization:

Ψ_{top} lives in the Hilbert space obtained by quantization of $H^3(\mathcal{M}, \mathbb{R})$ with symplectic structure $\omega(\alpha, \beta) = \int_{\mathcal{M}} \alpha \wedge \beta$.

\mathcal{Q} defining compl. str. allows to introduce a polarization:

$$\mathcal{Q} \in H^{3,0}, \mathcal{D}_i \mathcal{Q} \in H^{2,1} \Rightarrow \alpha = (\lambda^i \mathcal{Q} + x^i \mathcal{D}_i \mathcal{Q} + \bar{x}^i \bar{\mathcal{D}}_i \bar{\mathcal{Q}} + \bar{\lambda}^i \bar{\mathcal{Q}})$$

$$\begin{aligned} \omega(\delta \alpha, \delta \beta) &= (\delta \lambda^i \mathcal{Q} \delta \bar{\lambda}^j \beta - \delta \bar{\lambda}^i \mathcal{Q} \delta \lambda^j \beta + (\delta x^i \mathcal{D}_i \bar{x}^j \beta - \delta \bar{x}^i \mathcal{D}_i x^j \beta) \underset{\mathcal{D}_i \mathcal{D}_j}{\text{Hodge decomposition}}) \int_{\mathcal{M}} \alpha \wedge \beta \\ &= i \bar{e}^{-K} (\delta \lambda^i \delta \bar{\lambda}^j \beta - \delta \bar{\lambda}^i \delta \lambda^j \beta - g_{ij} (\delta x^i \delta \bar{x}^j \beta - \delta \bar{x}^i \delta x^j \beta)) \end{aligned}$$

$$\Rightarrow \{\lambda^i, \bar{\lambda}^j\} \sim e^*, \{x^i, \bar{x}^j\} \sim e^K g_{ij}$$

Then $\Psi_{\text{top}}(x, \lambda^i) = \langle \text{top} | x, \lambda^i \rangle_{\mathcal{Q}(E)}$ λ - coupling constant of top. string.

The holomorphic anomaly equation

describes the change of the wave function under the change of polarization.

- One can choose different representations.

For example: $\alpha = p^\alpha \partial_\lambda - q_\alpha \beta^\alpha$ defines "real" representation $\Psi_p(p)$ which is background independent, but basis dependent

OSV conjecture

- In 4d $N=2$ SUGRA, obtained as Type IIB/CY, there are solutions describing BPS (extremal) black holes.

Attractor mechanism: values of scalar fields (moduli) are fixed by black hole charges independently of their asymptotic values

$$\text{Re } X^A = p^A, \text{ Re } F_A = q_A$$

$$S_{BH} = \pi M^2 = -\frac{B_0}{4} \int d^4x \bar{F}_{AB} F^{AB}$$

$$Z_g = q_A X^A - p^A F_A - \text{central charge}$$

- This result can be rewritten as Legendre transform:

$$S_{BH}(q, p) = S_{BH}(q, p) - \pi \varphi^A \frac{\partial}{\partial \varphi^A} F_{BH}(\varphi, p)$$

$$\text{where } F_{BH}(\varphi, p) = -\pi \text{Im } F(p + i\varphi), \quad q_A = -\frac{1}{\pi} \frac{\partial F_{BH}}{\partial \varphi^A}$$

Remarkably, this result remains valid after including α' -corrections provided F - full topological free energy

S_{BH} - Wald's entropy

Conjecture

This is an approximation (of large charges) to exact formula: $Z_{BH}(\varphi, p) \approx \sum S(q, p) e^{\frac{i}{\pi} \varphi^A q_A} = |Z_{top}(p + i\varphi)|^2$

$$\Rightarrow S(q, p) = \int dx e^{-\pi i \varphi^A q_A} \Psi_{top}(p-x) \Psi_{top}(p+x)$$

Wigner distribution function

- What is $\Psi_{top}(p)$?

This is note $Z_{top}(x)|_{x^a=p^a}$, but $\Psi_{top}(p) = \langle \text{top} | p \rangle$

Problems:

measure of integration, contour
hypermultiplet contributions
non-perturbative effects

mixed ensemble
 p - micro-canonical
 q - canonical

↑ probability amplitude for wave function

Topological invariants

- Consider the A-model in the holomorphic limit $\bar{t}^k \rightarrow \infty$
 Then $F_g = \sum_{\beta \in H_2^+(\mathcal{M})} N_\beta^{(g)} e^{2\pi i \beta \cdot k t^k}$, $N_\beta^{(g)}$ - Gromov-Witten inv.
 rational
 count holomorphic maps

- There is another representation

$$F = \sum_{g=0}^{\infty} \lambda^{2g-2} F_g = \sum_{g=0}^{\infty} \sum_{\beta \in H_2^+(\mathcal{M})} \sum_{d=1}^{\infty} n_\beta^{(g)} \frac{1}{d} \left(2 \sin\left(\frac{d\beta}{2}\right)\right)^{2g-2} e^{2\pi i d \beta \cdot k t^k}$$

$n_\beta^{(g)}$ - Gopakumar-Vafa invariants
integer

(This arises from the one-loop contribution of M2-brane after lifting to M-theory)

- S-duality implies

$$Z_{\text{top}}(t, \lambda) = M(-e^{it})^{\frac{1}{2}} X(\mathcal{M}) Z_{\text{DT}}(e^{2\pi i t/\lambda}, e^{it})$$

where $M(q) = \prod_{k \geq 0} (1 - q^k)^{-k}$ - MacMahon function

$$Z_{\text{DT}}(y, q) = \sum_{\beta \in H_2^+} \sum_n \text{DT}(\beta, n) y^\beta q^n \quad \begin{array}{l} \text{captures contributions of} \\ \text{degenerate maps with } \beta = 0 \\ (\text{note: } n_0^{(0)} = -\frac{1}{2} X(\mathcal{M})) \end{array}$$

$\text{DT}(\beta, n)$ - Donaldson-Thomas invariants

count bound states of D6, D2 on β , and n D0-branes

- MNOP formula:

$$Z_{\text{DT}}(y, q) = M(-q)^{X(\mathcal{M})} \prod_{\beta \in H_2^+} \prod_{k \geq 0} (1 - (-q)^k y^\beta)^{k n_\beta^{(k)}} \times \prod_{\beta \in H_2^+} \prod_{g=1}^{g_{\max}(\beta)} \prod_{l=0}^{2g-2} (1 - (-q)^{g-l-1} y^\beta)^{\binom{g+l}{2} \binom{2g-2}{l} n_\beta^{(g)}}$$

Other applications of topological strings

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1) Mirror symmetry

Solve "classical" B-model, then map to A-model

2) Geometric engineering

Consider a CY with a singularity and zoom around it
(or non-compact CY) \rightarrow gravity decouples

$\rightarrow N=2$ gauge theory

with prepotential given by F_0

and Seiberg-Witten curve encoded in the mirror CY
(in type IIB)

3) Topological branes

There is also a theory of open topological strings containing D-branes

They are used to describe:

- geometric transition - open/closed string duality in the limit of large N (#D-branes)
- $N=1$ gauge theories

4) Refined topological string

\mathbb{R} -background, non-commutativity

5) Relations to matrix models

integrable hierarchies
resurgence
