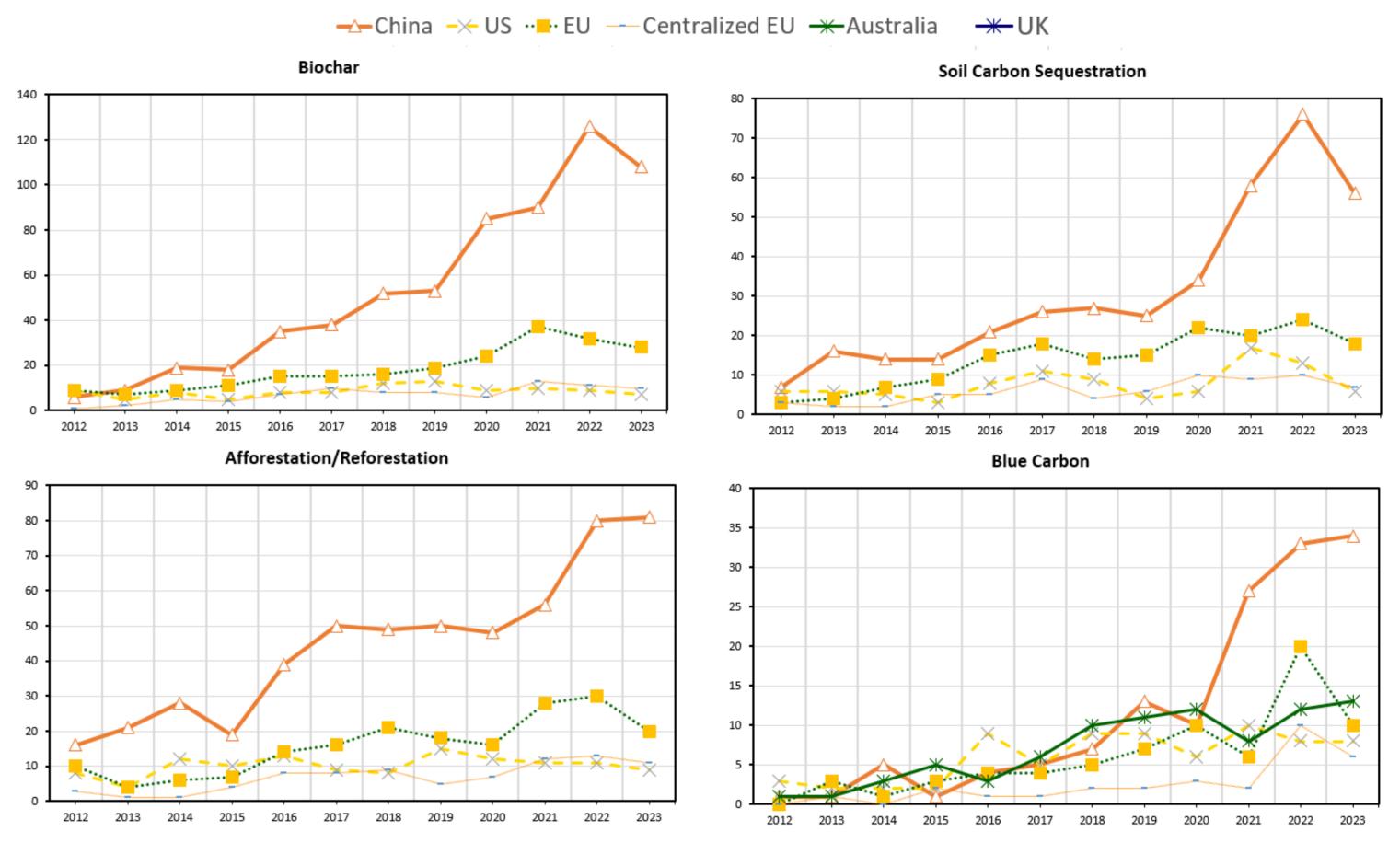

# Abstract

## In order to **understand the recent evolution of Carbon Dioxide Removal (CDR) research efforts** we:

- Conducted a **systematic literature review** of 7,893 CDR research publications in 2012-2023 based on the search query in Minx et al. (2017, 2018)
- Examined geographic distribution and contributors
- Analyzed national and regional **funding allocation**
- Observed collaborative patterns and the formation of research communities

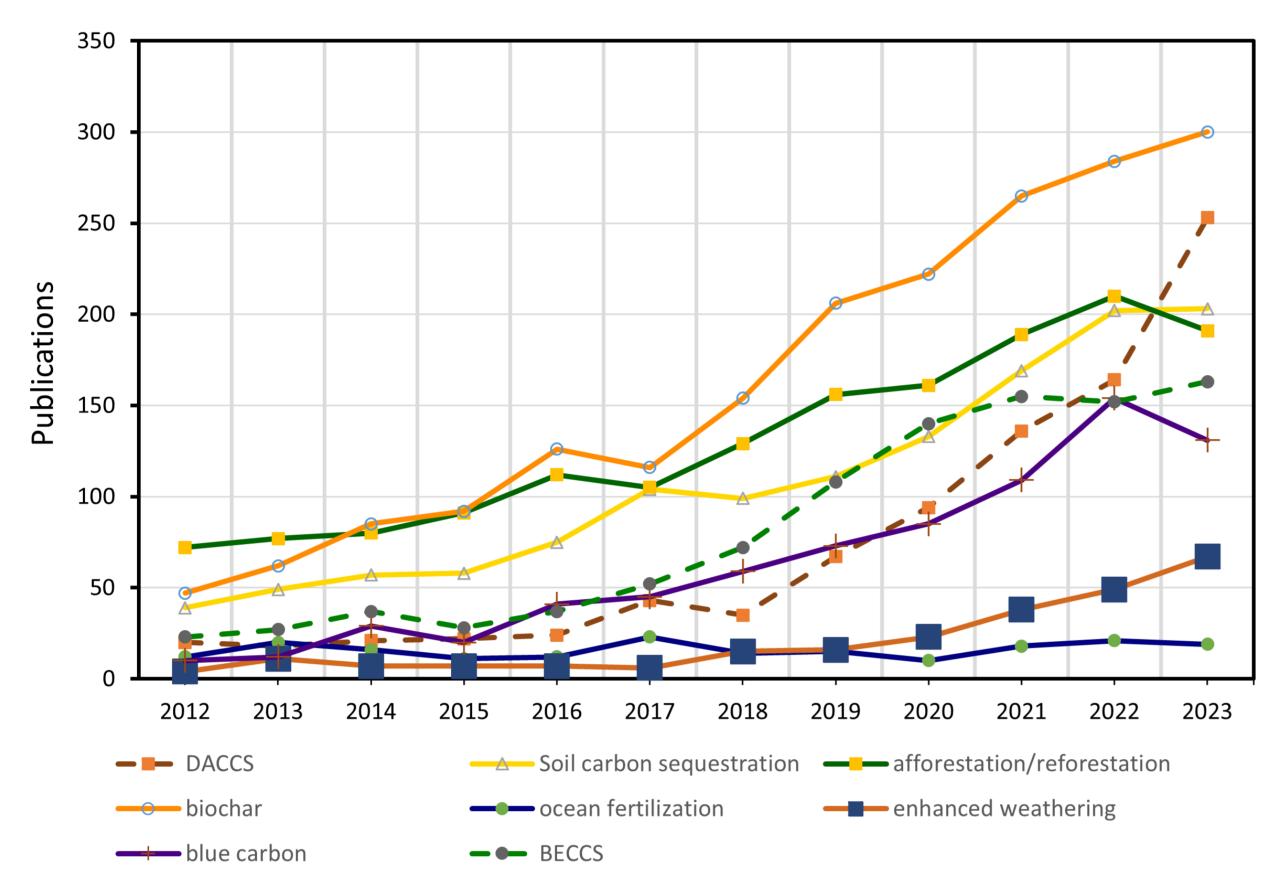
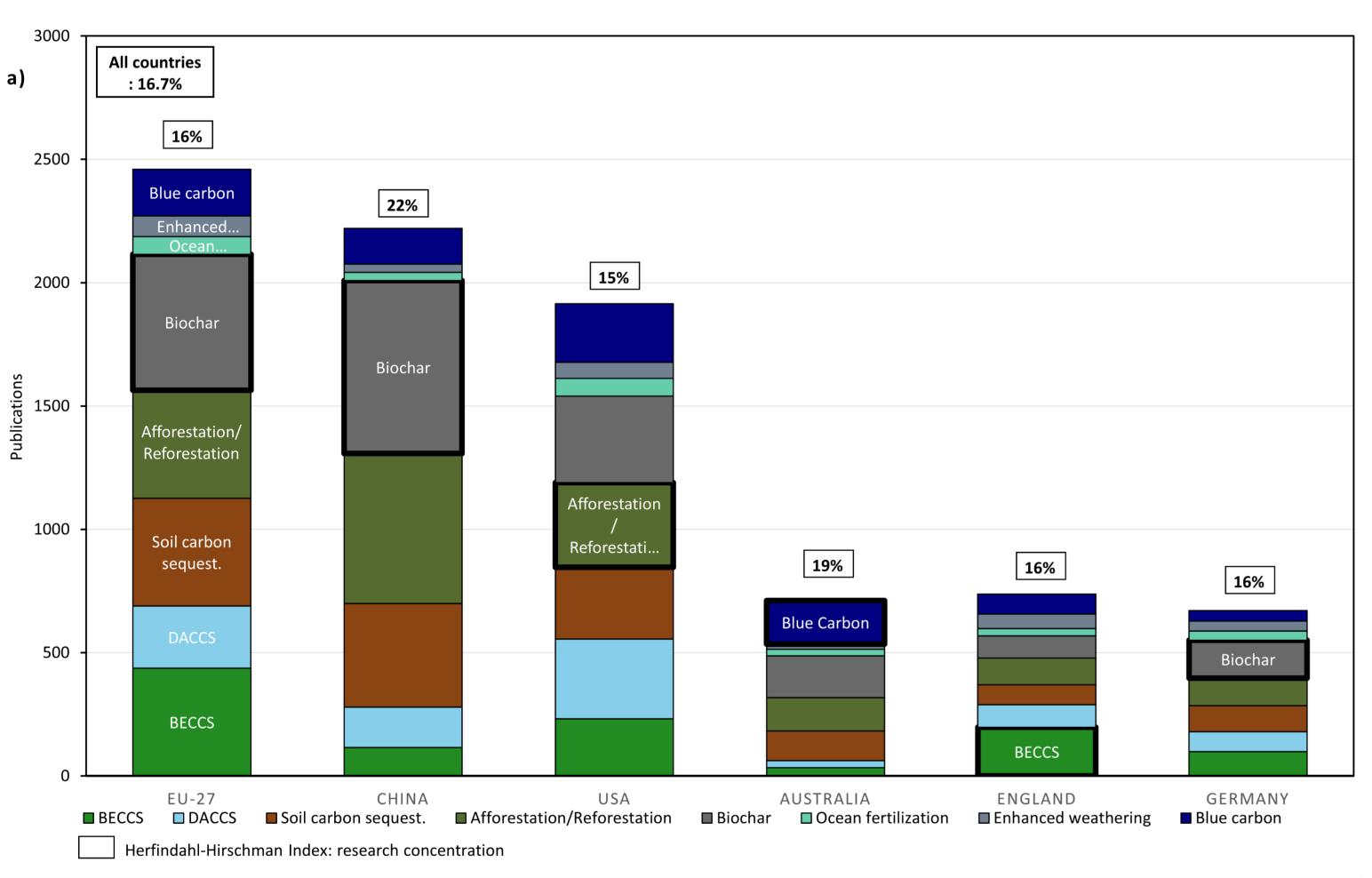
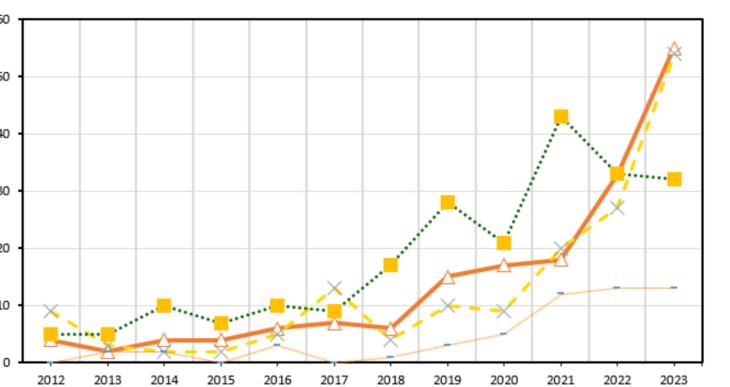


Fig. 1: Number of articles published per year for each type of CDR option

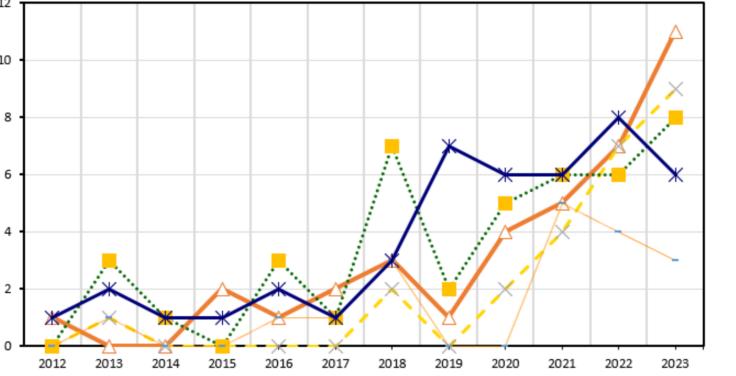

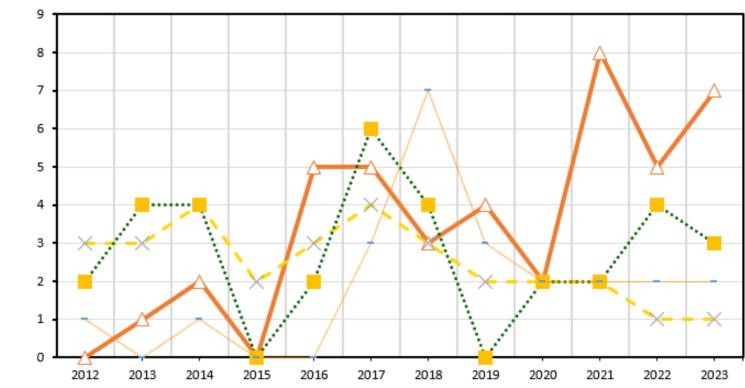

# **Key findings**

- Significant growth in CDR publications is observed after **2015** and **2018**, driven by **Europe, China, and the US**.
- Biochar, afforestation/reforestation, and soil carbon sequestration are among the most researched CDR options, with DACCS, BECCS, and Blue Carbon also receiving substantial attention, especially in 2023.
- Our review highlights **different national funding approaches** for CDR: in China, the research is largely funded nationally. In the US and in the EU, public funding covers less than a third of CDR research.
- Regarding collaborative patterns in CDR research, our econometric analysis reveals positive factors for collaboration, including common language, social/economic proximity, student exchange programs, and national climate change policy pledges.
