Dynamic simulation of a supercritical helium discharge through a deported safety device for fusion reactor cryogenic systems

Context

- Safety demonstration of cryogenic systems in future fusion reactors
- No scientific calculation tool qualified to perform safety evaluation of fusion reactor

CATHARE : Reference tool for safety evaluation of Pressurized Water Reactor (PWR) 2-fluid and 6 equation model (Mass, Momentum and Energy balance equations)

- Qualified for water on pressure and temperature range in PWR with separate effect tests and integral loop tests
- Thermodynamic and transport properties of helium are available in the code (REFPROP V9.2 NIST) > Need to evaluate results given by CATHARE with supercritical helium

Accidental transients on tokamak reactor have been identified to perform first validation tests on CATHARE

- Quench of superconducting magnets
- > Heat load due to loss of insulating vacuum of cryogenic lines
- Loss of insulating vacuum around a 100L liquid helium tank
- Cases with and without adiabatic discharge line
- 24000 W injected in the tank $(1,85W/cm^2 \times S_{tank})$
- Allowed Pmax=17,6 bar

In case of an adiabatic discharge line :

Same safety valve for both cases, size according applicable standards for a tank $(Section = 43, 3 mm^{2})$



> Higher Pmax in the tank even if the discharge line is adiabatic Geometrical 1-D effects in the line \rightarrow impact on the mass flowrate

Conclusions

- CATHARE gives satisfactory results with supercritical helium Results on deported safety valve show the relevance of using CATHARE

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Influence of a discharge line on the safety relief valve sizing

Reference case :



Initial Condition : Liquid level = 90 % P = 1barT = 4.2KTotal Helium mass = 11kg

Tank dimension : Height = 1mInner diameter = 0.35m Surface = $1.3m^2$ Volume = 96.2L

In case of a heat load on the discharge line :

Helium mass flow **Reference case** Adiabatic line case at junction tank/line Adiabatic line case in safety valve

Heat flux applied to the discharge line Reference (no line) $0 W/cm^2$ 0.5 W/cm²

 1 W/cm^2 1.85 W/cm²

- - The additional heat input on the line
 - The decreased of the sonic density and velocity in the valve throat with Helium heating

> Using applicable standards for tank can lead to undersized the valve section with a discharge line > The heat flux received in the discharge line must be determined to size correctly the safety relief value

First validation of the pressure and temperature increase in a supercritical Helium tank

- Modelling of the "Cryostat Soupape" experiment
- Loss of insulating vacuum around a 10L liquid helium tank
- Discharge in supercritical state
- The heat flux received by the supercritical fluid is experimentally measured : <u>1,85 W/cm²</u>
- The pressure and the mean temperature evolution calculated by CATHARE before the safety valve opening is consistent with experimental measurements

Case with a discharge line :



• Uniform heat flux are applied along the discharge line For each heat flux, the safety value section is adapt to insure a max pressure of Pmax = 17.6 bar in the tank

The heat flux received by the line must be well determined to correctly size the valve

With a heat flux on the discharge line, the section of the safety relief valve must be oversized because of :

Characterize the heat flux received by a forced flow SHe cryoline. Perspectives Improve CATHARE validation with helium and implement required models







Liquid level = 90 %

Total Helium mass = 12,3kg (> 11,3% to take into account additional mass of Helium gas in the discharge line)
