Background

Allergic rhinitis is a public health concern with a high prevalence (up to 25% in European countries), increasing over the last decades, high economic and social costs, impact on quality of life and a strong association with asthma.

Few data exist considering the dose response relationship between pollen counts and allergic rhino-conjunctivitis in the general population.

Objective

To analyse the short term association between daily pollen counts and daily allergic rhinitis and/or conjunctivitis (ARC) counts in the general population, a pilot study was carried out in the urban area of Clermont-Ferrand (France), using delivered drug prescriptions as the health indicator.

Material and Methods

Study area:

the city of Clermont-Ferrand and 17 towns localised around, at a maximum distance of 13km, i.e. 265 000 inhabitants

Study period:

2000-2001

Health data:

Data source : the regional French Health Care database.

A case of ARC was defined as an individual:

- i) resident in the urban area of Clermont-Ferrand,
- ii) aged 5 year old or more,
- iii) with a prescription containing antihistamine drugs for systemic use associated with a local treatment for allergic rhinitis, conjunctivitis, or both.

ARC cases were aggregated per day to construct the health indicator.

Exposure data:

Data source: the French Aerobiology Network

Pollens studied:

- 12 allergenic pollens: *Corylus* (Hazel tree), *Cupressaceae* (Cypress), *Alnus* (Alder), *Fraxinus* (Ash), *Betula* (Birch), *Salix* (Willow), *Quercus* (Oak), *Platanus* (Plane-tree), *Poaceae* (Grass), *Plantaginaceae* (Plantain), *Artemisia* (Mugwort), and *Ambrosia* (Ragweed)

- one non allergenic pollen, *Pinus* (Pine)

Daily pollens counts were measured by one measurement station localised in the city of Clermont-Ferrand

Statistical analysis

Daily variations of ARC were correlated with daily pollen counts using Poisson regression models, controlling for temporal trends, air pollution, and weather.

Analyses were performed on the whole population and by age groups (5-14, 15-44, 45-64, and ≥ 65 years old).

Results

Figure 1. Distribution of daily ARC counts (top) and pollen season (back), Clermont-Ferrand, 2000-2001



About 50 % of ARC cases occurred between mid-April and mid-July (Figure 1).

Consistent positive and significant associations between daily counts of pollen and ARC were found for Poaceae, Quercus, Betula, Fraxinus and Cupressaceae (Table 3).

Analyses by age group showed:

- significant associations were found for Quercus, Betula, Fraxinus, in all age groups with the highest RR in the 15-44 age group
- the RR increased with age groups for Cupressaceae, with a maximum in the ≥ 65 group
- significant associations were found in the lowest and the highest age groups for Poaceae.

Although non significant, positive associations were generally found with the other pollens.

For Pinus, no association was found, as expected.

Conclusion

Positive associations with daily counts of ARC were found for most of pollens, though consistent and significant only for Betula, Cupressaceae, Quercus, Fraxinus, and Poaceae. Results were consistent with clinical observations.

These results need to be confirmed by studies performed on data collected over a longer period of time.
