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# **Comparison of the thermomechanical performance** of tubular absorber geometries for CSP

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### Introduction

- CSP will play a role in the energy transition: it is expected to produce 13-15% of the world's electricity by 2050 [1].
- The SiCsun project aims to increase the temperature of solar power plant receivers (>900 °C) in turn to improve the conversion efficiency of these plants.
- Reaching such high temperatures requires the use of more efficient materials. Silicon carbide (SiC) appears to be a good candidate [2].
- It is also necessary to obtain a high heat exchange coefficient between the heat transfer fluid and the high absorber tube: use of a

# **Objectives:**

- Determining the appropriate receiver geometry
- Minimising the probability of rupture
- Identifying areas of concentrated stress

# SiCSun receiver model

- Control settings: ▶ irradiance
  - $E_{\rm solar,e} = 320 \, \rm kW \, m^{-2}$
- particle temperature exponential profile

 $T_{\rm p,in} = 300 \,^{\circ}\mathrm{C}$  $T_{\rm p,out} = 900 \,^{\circ}{\rm C}$

Losses modeling:



- Maximum temperature of 1100 °C
- No significant radial temperature gradient
- ► Temperature difference of about 400 °C between the insolated side and the back of the tube
- ► Maximum stress of  $-1.0 \times 10^8$  Pa (tensile) stress)
- Homogeneous stress distribution on the insolated side

Summary of results

Cross-section of the tube, principal stress field in MPa	Hexadecagon	Centred Off-centred	103 MPa 119 MPa	0.77 % 2.5 %			



Modeling conditions:

- unidirectional solar flux
- off-centred geometries insolated on thin side

# Achievable geometries with Boostec<sup>®</sup>





Summary of modeling results for different geometries

- Very few compression zones (in red)
- Majority of tensile stress
- Highest stresses on insolated and rear side

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Overall deformation in relation to the reference position, the deformation is exaggerated.

#### Conclusion

 $\triangleright$  The maximum stress is a tensile stress, which reaches -100 MPa, but is still far below the tensile

strength of SiC (about 210 MPa)

- Compressive stresses are negligible compared to the compressive strength of SiC (about 3 GPa)
- ▶ The insolated side and the opposite side are the two areas mainly under tensile stress
- Global deformation is about 1 cm in all situations
- Centred geometries generate less stress than off-centred ones
- The centred hexadecagon outperforms other geometries

### **Outlook and advice**

- The tube must have as many faces as possible and a centered geometry
- The rear panel should be insulated to prevent radiative losses and reduce the temperature gradient between the front and rear panels
- Absorber tube fastening system must allow for deformation of at least 1 cm

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
