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# Heterogeneous mixture of microplastics: impact on the freshwater ecosystem engineer (Tubifex tubifex) and its role in biogeochemical processes



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## Introduction

Deposit-feeding bioturbators are key actors in sediment functioning of aquatic ecosystems. Bioturbators, such as *Tubifex tubifex*, contribute to organic matter degradation and nutrient recycling in freshwater sediments due to their ability to rework sediment, and to produce and irrigate biogenic their bioturbation (galleries). By structures activities, tubificid worms can stimulate microorganisms and associated biogeochemical processes occurring at the water-sediment interface.

Nevertheless, the consequences of microplastic ingestion on bioturbation activities and biogeochemical processes have never been studied.

Therefore, the objective of this study was to investigate the effects of sediment contamination with a heterogeneous mixture of different shapes, sizes and polymer types of microplastic pollutants (i.e. polymers of polystyrene and polyamide) on the survival, the physiological state and the bioturbation activity of *tubificid* worms.

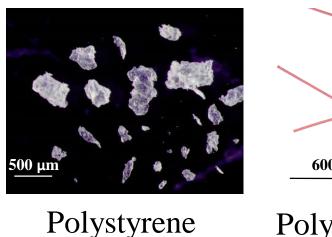
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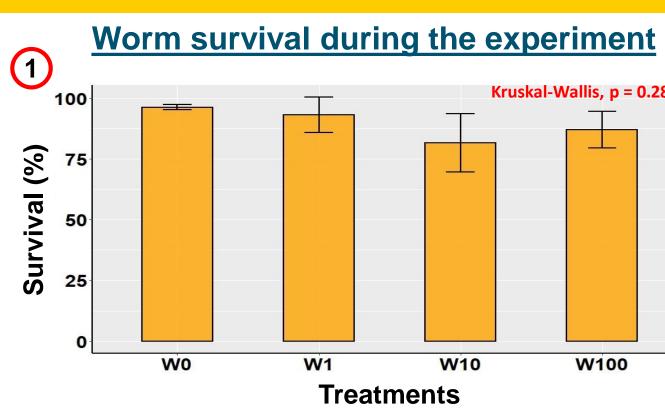


## **Microplastics (MPs)**

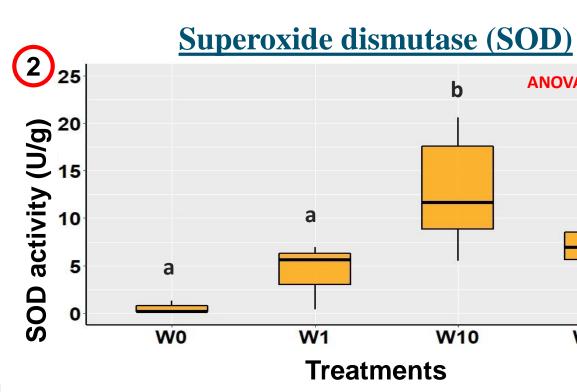


Polyamide fibers

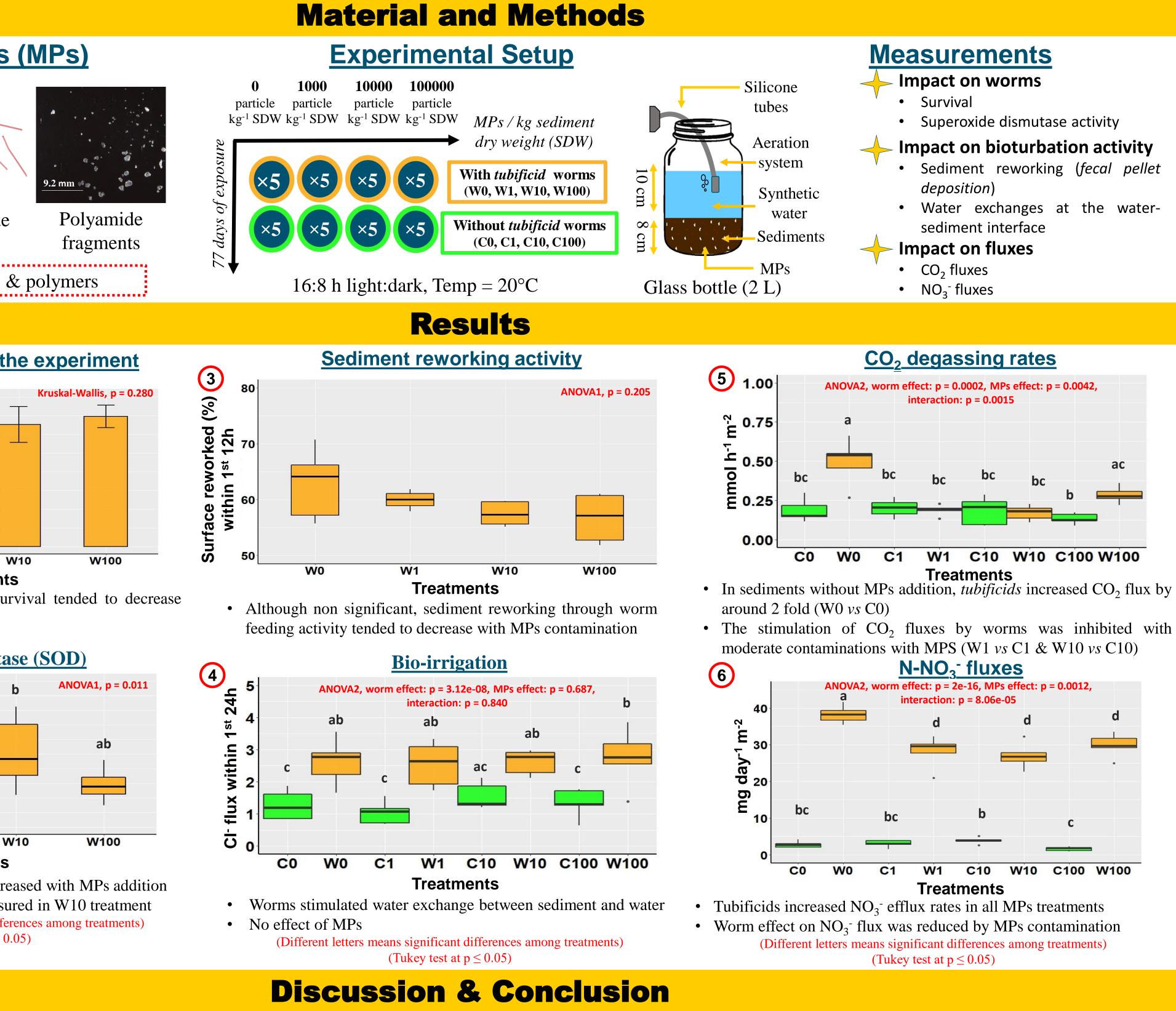

• Although non significant, worm survival tended to decrease with MPs contamination



• Oxidative stress (SOD activity) increased with MPs addition • The highest SOD activity was measured in W10 treatment (Different letters means significant differences among treatments) (Tukey test at  $p \le 0.05$ )



An increase in oxidative stress was observed in *tubificid* worms exposed to MPs. Significant cellular damage indicated by SOD activity was considered as an early warning for worm population because of the inverse trend on *Tubifex* survival depending on MPs exposure.

Worm feeding activity (fecal pellet production) was apparently more affected by MPs contamination than bio-irrigation activity. In link with feeding activity decreasing trend, the roles played by *tubificid* worms on organic matter mineralization (CO<sub>2</sub> flux) and nutrient cycling (NO<sub>3</sub><sup>-</sup> flux) were affected by MPs contamination. Surprisingly, at the highest MPs concentration (W100), worms tended to be less affected than at a moderate MPs concentration (W10). One explanation of this interesting result would be that, at the highest concentration, MPs were more easily detected and avoided by worms than at lower concentrations.
