## Context :

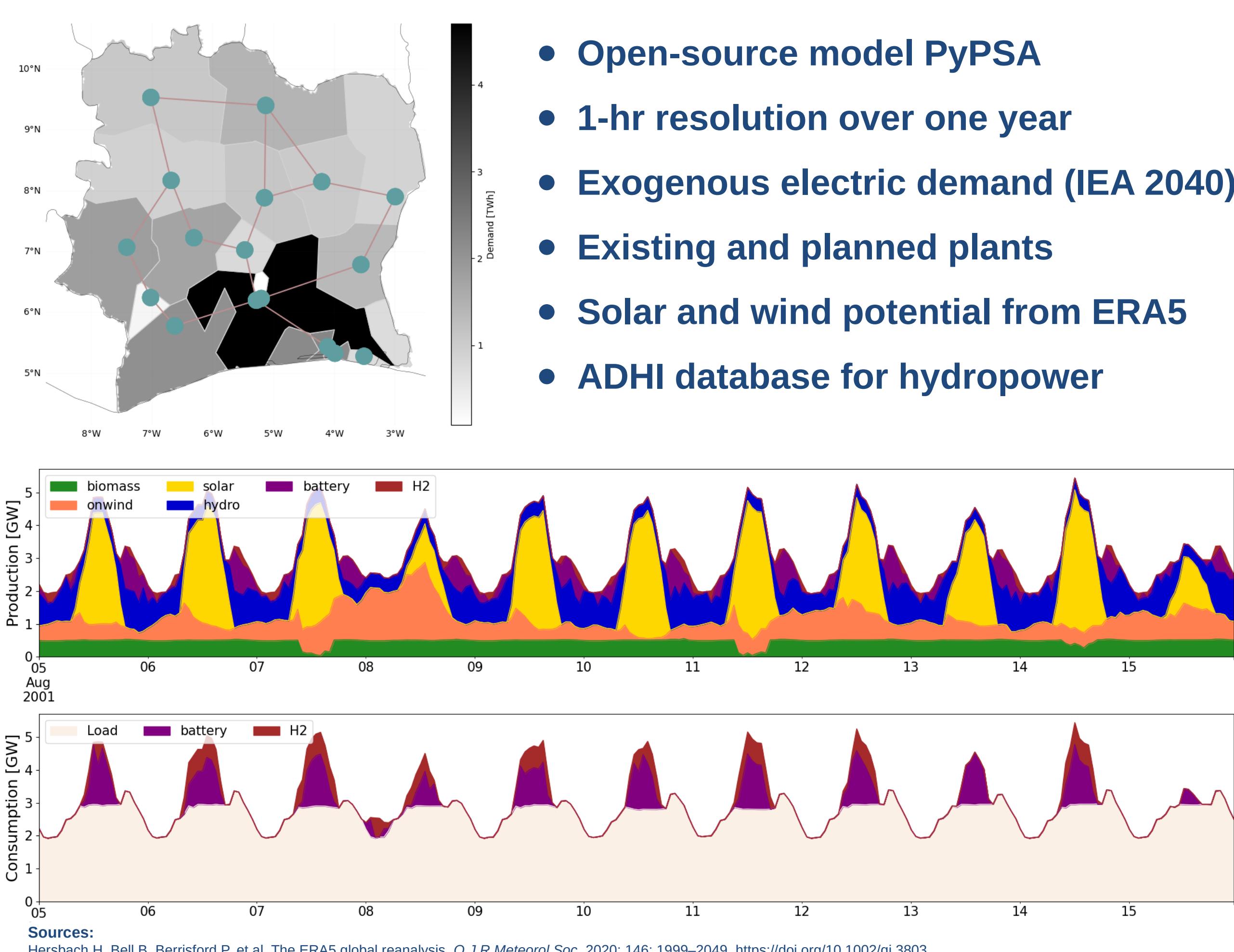
- Rapid growth in demand for electricity in West Africa
- Multiple resources available (hydro, biomass, solar, gas)
- By 2030, -30% CO<sub>2</sub> emissions & renewable energy supply > 45%

## Research questions :

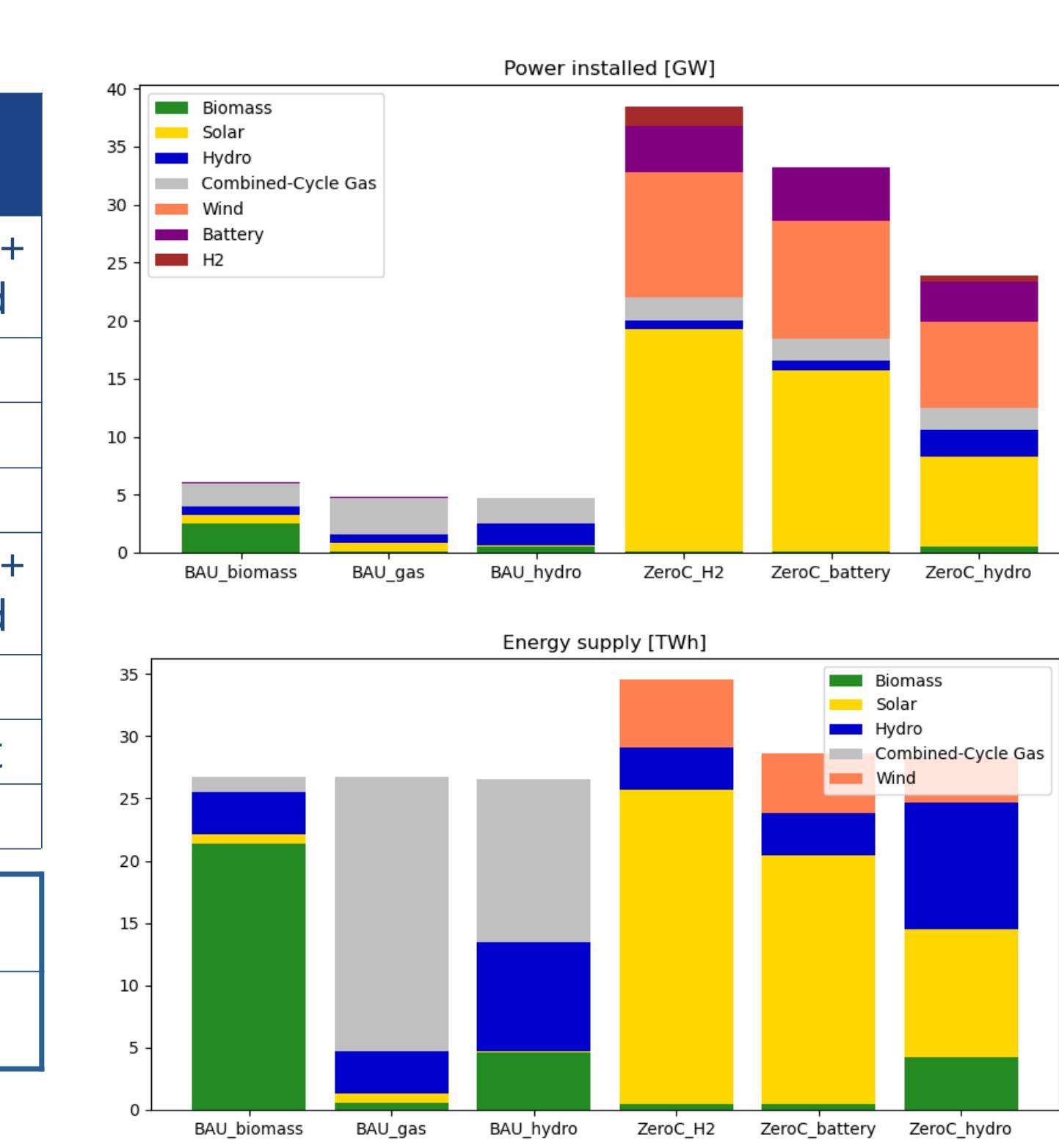
- What are the possible pathways for the electricity mix of Côte d'Ivoire ?
- Should we focus on cost optimization and direct CO<sub>2</sub> emissions only ?
- How reliable is the electricity from these different mixes ?

## Usual design of the electricity grid:



### Least-cost optimization for 6 scenarios:

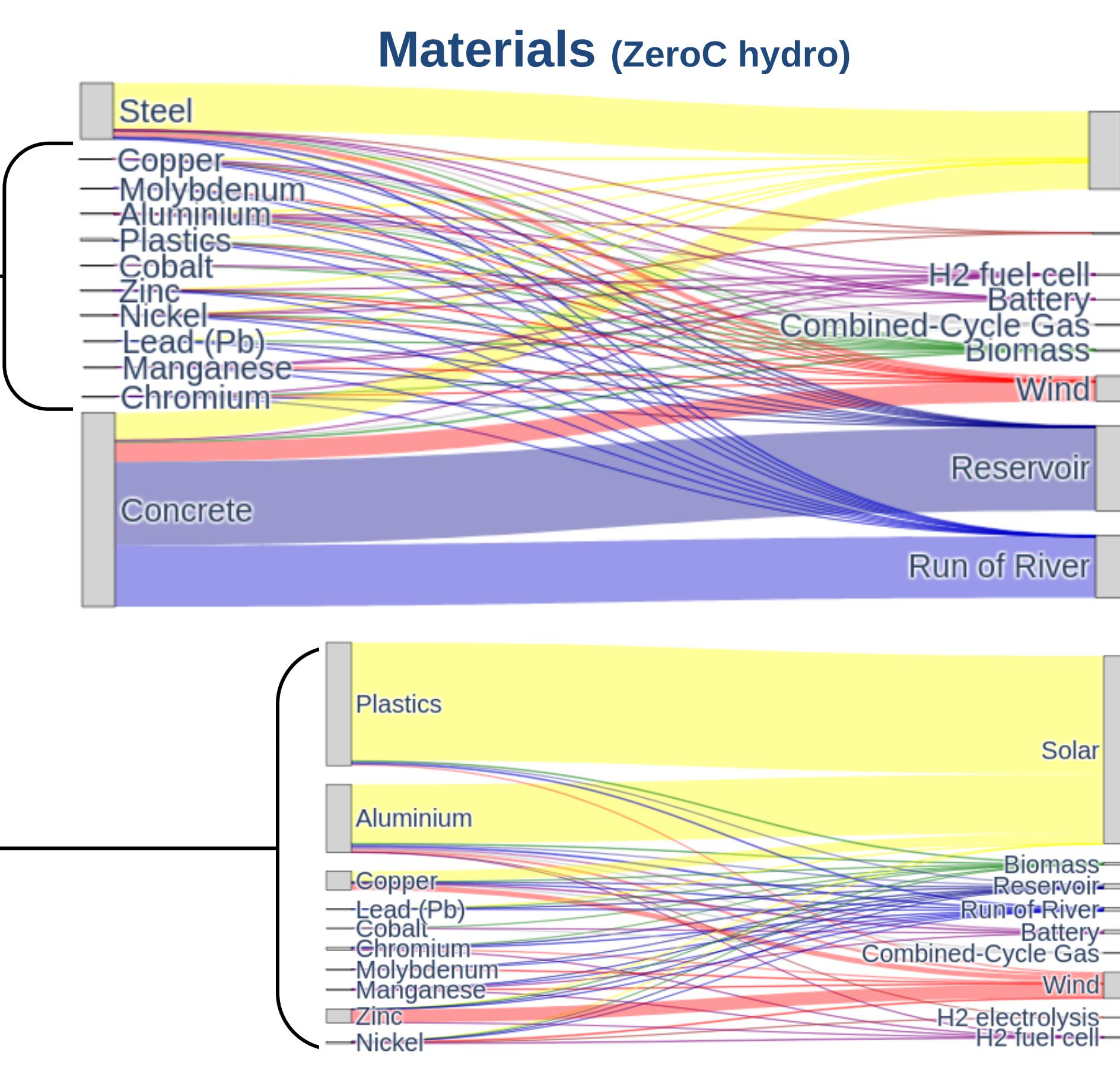
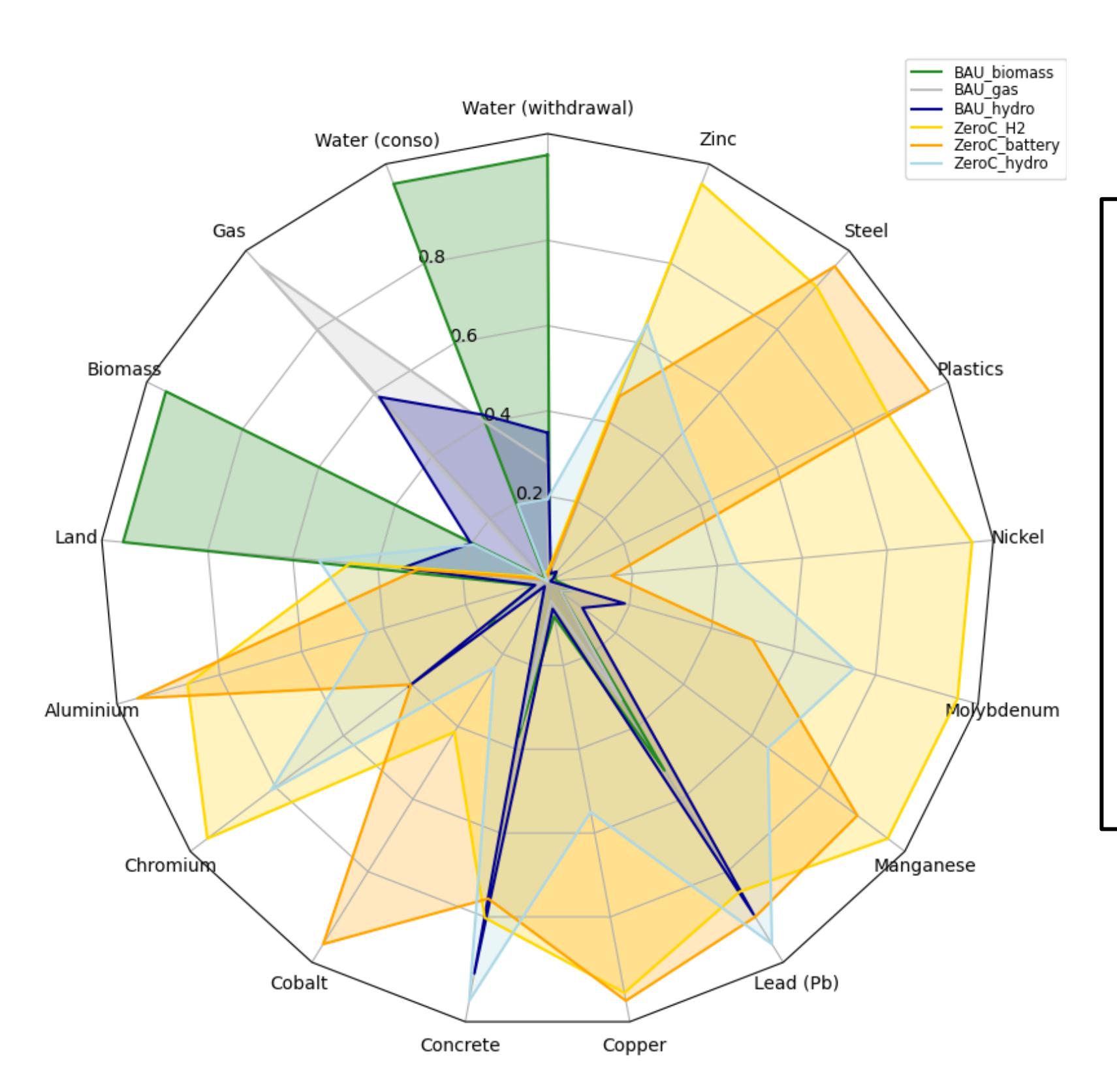

- Large variations of LCOE and CO<sub>2</sub> emissions
- High sensitivity to CO<sub>2</sub> limit
- Mostly one dominant source for each scenario

- Growing rate of installed capacities ?
- Demand sensitivity ?
- On-grid electricity only ?
- How to implement these mixes ?

## Resources consumption :



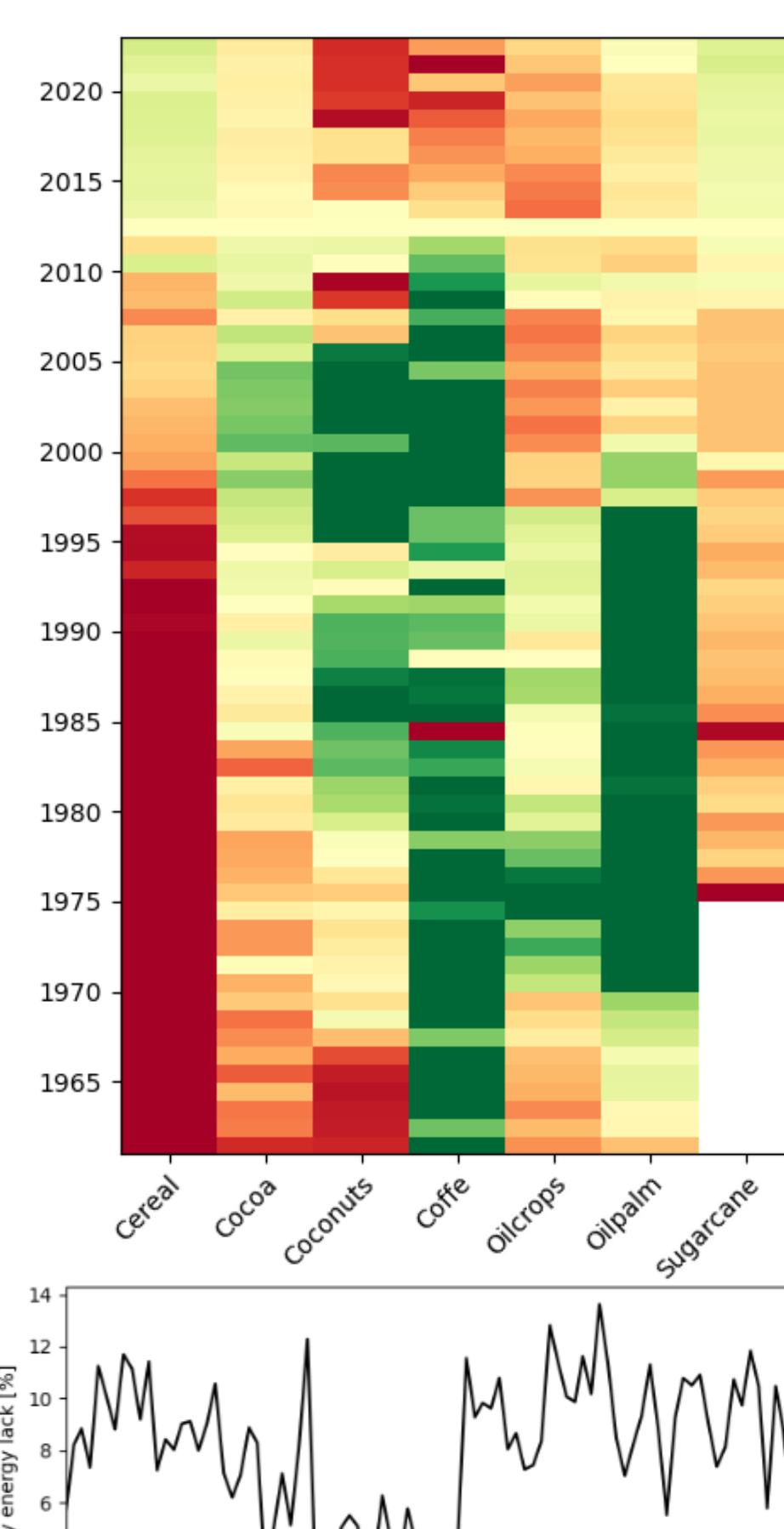

- Every scenarios consume resources
- Diversified mix allows trade-offs in resource use
- Carbon footprint : every scenario emits CO<sub>2</sub>
- Should consider geographical distribution of impacts

- Availability of materials in the future ?
- Variability and uncertainties of the consumptions ?
- Interactions between sectors ? Not a real nexus approach



## Sensitivity to resources :

- Highest impact from the interannual variability of hydro
- Gas production variable from year to another
- Large variations of agricultural yields for biomass production

- Exchanges with other countries ?
- Climate projections ?

## Conclusion:

- ❖ Any electricity mix has impacts, there is no “clean” mix
- ❖ Need to consider multiple incomparable criteria to design the mix
- ❖ No ideal electricity mix, but political choices

## Rethink energy modeling :

- Links with other approaches
  - electrification planning
  - other energy sources/uses
- Include cross-sectoral impacts
  - use conflicts (e.g., water, land)
  - demand evolution
  - imports of energy technologies
- Consider the implementation of the mix
  - real installation capacities
  - technology diffusion
  - social behavior and lifestyles
  - impacts on populations and biodiversity
