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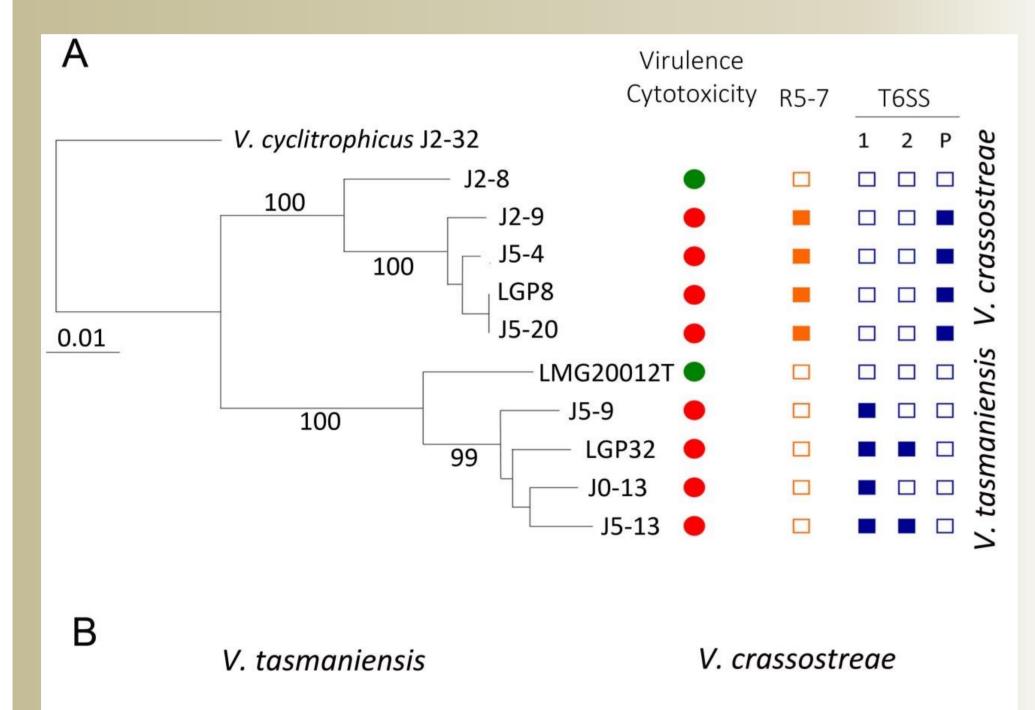
Introduction. Vibrio species cause infectious diseases in human and animals, but they can also live as

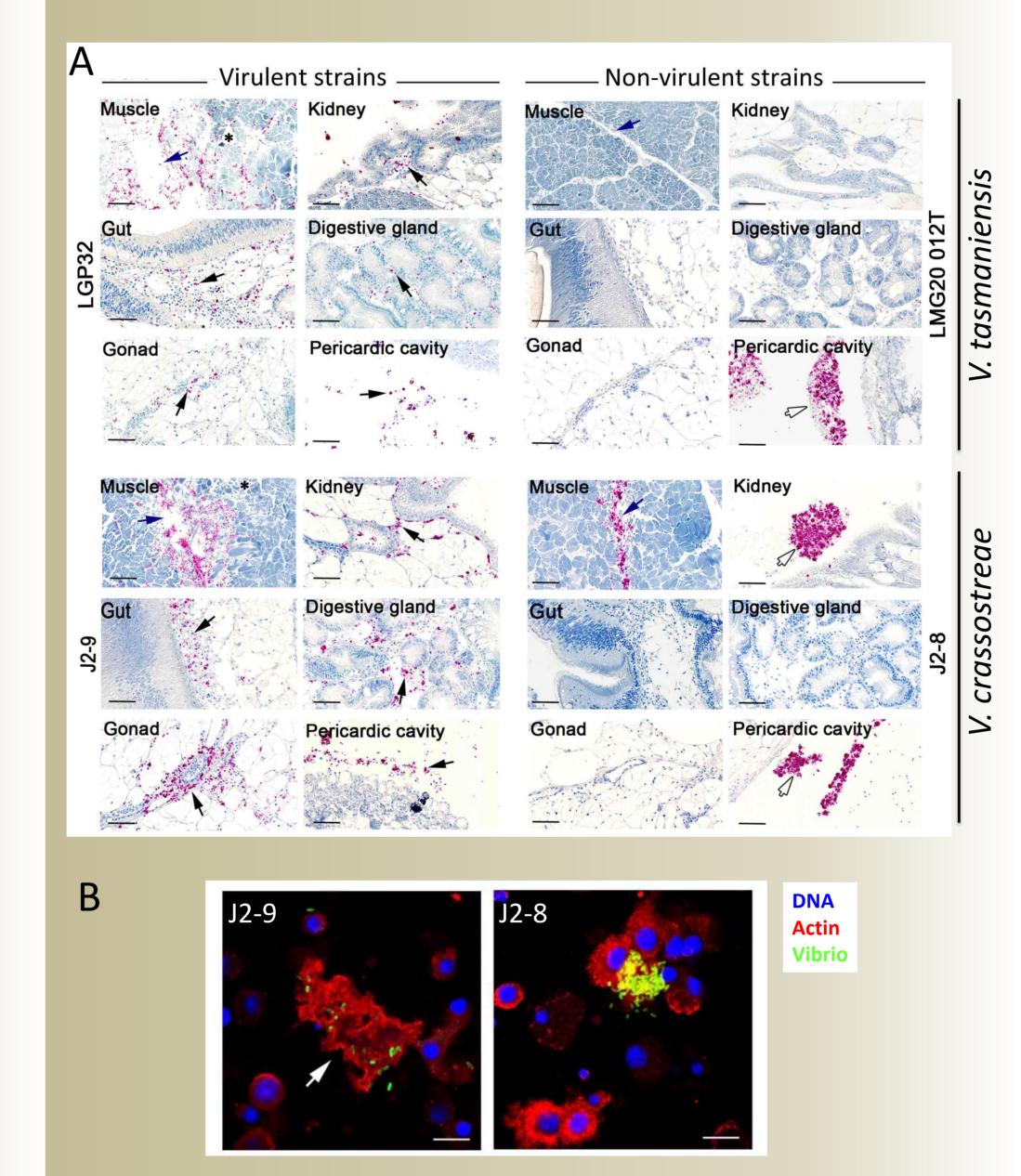

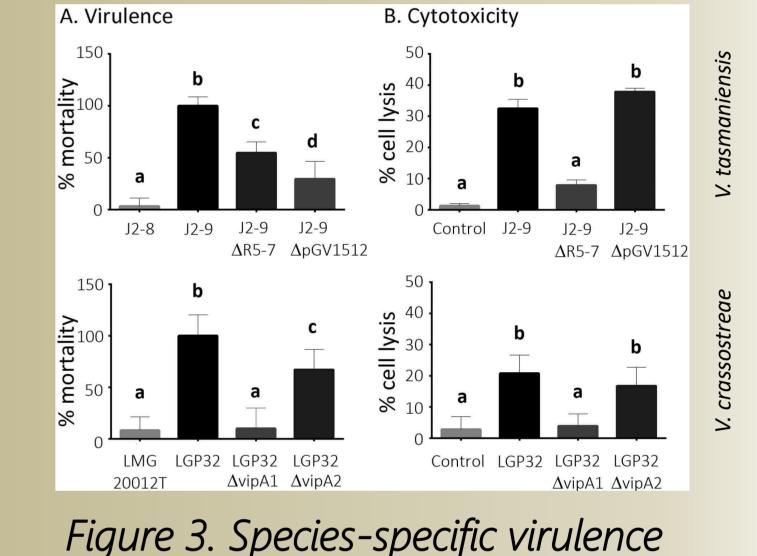
• Immune cell lysis is a trait common to virulent strains

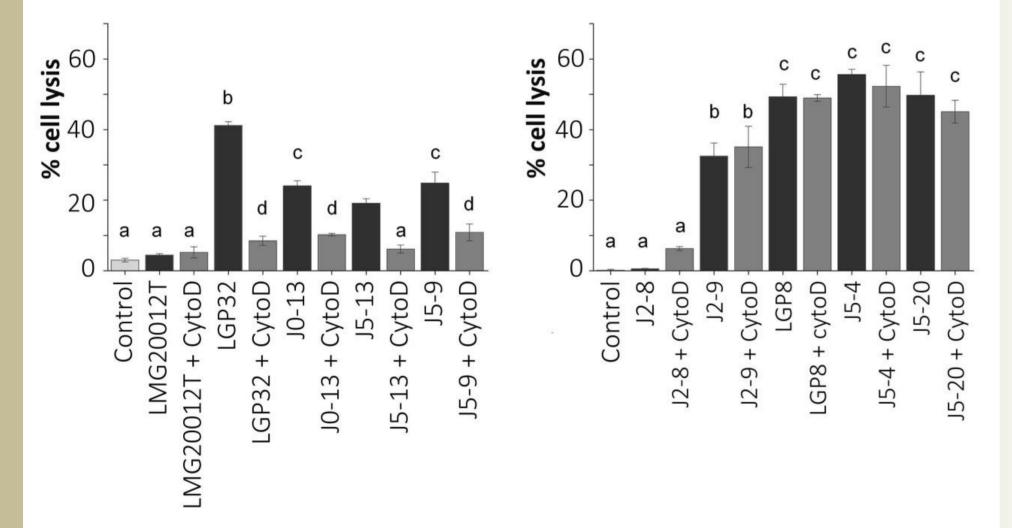


Figure 1. Species-specific mechanisms of cytotoxicity in V. crassostreae and V. tasmaniensis. (A) MLST on 6 core genes. Strain cytotoxicity and virulence correlate (red/green). Presence/absence of potential virulence factorsT6SS and R5-7 is displayed. (B) In vitro cytotoxicity toward immune cells is phagoctytosis-dependent for V. tasmaniensis only.

Figure 2. Virulent strains cause damage to hemocytes and escape hemocyte aggregates in vivo. (A) Histological sections of oysters infected with vibrios (pink). (B) Immune cell lysis induced by virulent strains in oyster hemolymph. Nonvirulent strains are controlled by hemocytes.

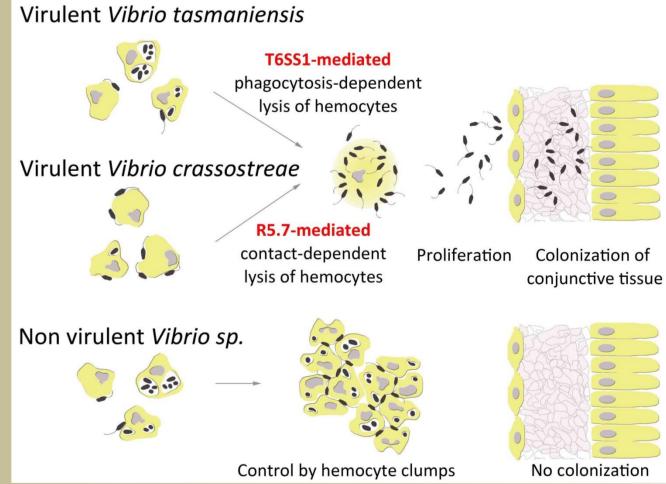


Figure 4. Impairment of oyster cellular immunity as a common strategy of immune evasion

Conclusions I Proliferation of commensal vibrios is controlled by the host immune system, preventing systemic infections in oysters, whereas the successful infection of virulent strains relies on species-specific molecular determinants that converge to compromise host immune cell function.

Vibrio crassostreae and V. tasmaniensis use distinct mechanisms to cause hemocyte lysis. V. crassostreae requires an ancestral gene encoding a protein of unknown function, R5-7, whereas V. tasmaniensis (which lacks R5-7) requires intracellular secretion of T6SS effectors.

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
