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Adaptive optics flood-illumination ophthalmoscope with structured illumination capabilities

QBI 2019 January 9-11, Rennes

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Purpose: Improve the lateral resolution and achieve optical sectioning with an Adaptive Optics Flood Illumination Ophthalmoscope (AOFIO) by means of tailored Structured Illumination Microscopy (SIM) instrument and algorithms.

Retinal imaging systems		
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AOFIO	High framerate and high lateral resolution	Poor axial resolution, low contrast images
AO Scanning Laser Ophthalmoscope (AO-SLO)	Optical sectioning (OS), high contrast images, high lateral resolution	Relatively slow framerate Distortion (scanning)
Optical Coherence Tomography (OCT)	High axial resolution	Relatively more complex (interferometry), Distortion (scanning)

SIM-assisted optically sectioned Bayesian reconstruction for retinal imaging

<u>Traditional approach</u> (static object, sinusoid phase $\phi = 0$, 120 and 240) can't be used: eye motion

Proposed approach: Project a static fringe pattern (one per orientation) and take advantage of the eye motion to obtain sinusoid phase diversity as suggested by [2]. Within the Bayesian framework [3], reconstruct the in-focus layer, the out-of-focus layers' contribution and the retinal shifts, while minimizing noise amplification. This method yields both **optical sectioning and super resolution**.

Our reconstruction method:

- Calibrates the instrumental parameters $({m h}_0, {m h}_1)$
- Estimates the bell t, the shifts $\{s_l\}$ [6] and the illumination patterns $\{m_l\}$ from the data $\{i_l\}$
- Estimates the Power Spectral Density (PSD) of the object and of the noise for regularization [7]
- Within the Bayesian framework, estimates jointly the in-focus layer o_0 and the out-of-focus contribution o_{defoc} by minimizing numerically the following cost function:

where $R(\boldsymbol{o}) = \sum_{f} \frac{|\tilde{\boldsymbol{o}}(f)|^{2}}{2.PSD_{0}(f)}$
