## Introduction

- Reducing NO<sub>x</sub> emissions from hydrogen spark ignition engines (H<sub>2</sub>SIEs) can be achieved through ultra-lean operation ( $\phi$  < 0.6), maintaining low flame temperatures and high thermal efficiency.
- In H<sub>2</sub>SIEs, turbulent burning velocity ( $S_{T}$ ) is influenced by thermochemical state and turbulence-flame interactions.
- Accurate determination of  $S_{\tau}$  is crucial for simulations and retrofitting, especially under high pressure where small changes in  $\phi$  affect combustion regimes and flame morphologies.
- This study measured  $S_{\tau}$  for ultra-lean premixed turbulent outwardly propagating flames (PTOPF) under various conditions: 0.2 <  $\phi$  < 0.6, 0.1 MPa < Pu < 0.4 MPa, and u' = 0.49 - 2.45 m/s.

## **Experimental setup**

- Spherical stainless steel combustion chamber: V = 4.2 L, R = 10 cm,  $\bullet$  $L_{\rm T}$  = 2.34 mm [1].
- Six four-blade fans: Homogeneous and isotropic turbulence (up to 20 mm) [1].

### Methodology

- Two orthogonal pairs of quartz windows.
- Capactive discharge system: Two tungsten electrodes ( $E_{min} = 5 \text{ mJ}$ ).

# **Conclusion and Perspectives**

- New PTOPF experiments to measure  $S_{T}$  for ultra-lean H<sub>2</sub>/air mixtures at  $\phi = 0.2 0.6$ ,  $p_{II} = 0.1$  MPa 0.4 MPa, u' = 0.49 2.45 m/s and  $T_{II} = 373$  K.
- $V_{\rm T}$  increases with rising  $u', \phi$  and  $p_{\rm H}$ .
- Significant sources of uncertainty in characterazing PTOPF due to lack of experimental data and definitions for ultra-lean H<sub>2</sub>/air laminar flame parameters.
- PRISME correlation, which considers Le, Ka, and Da, in very good agreement with both literature and current datasets.
- Finally, correction accounting for the thermo-diffusive response for lean premixed H<sub>2</sub>/air flame ( $\omega_2$ ) provide promising insights to revisit currently used definitions.
- Perspectives: PIV-tomography, Water addition (Thesis available at PRISME).
