Abstract :

Smart Sensors are crucial technological building blocks for a wide range of applications including information technologies, automotive, industrial systems, health monitoring and environmental quality monitoring. In the context of Internet of Things (IoT), ultra-low-power sensors integrated on CMOS is an interesting option for Wireless Sensor Nodes (WSN) for real-time environmental quality monitoring [1], [2].

In this talk, we present the interest of Fully Depleted Silicon On Insulator (FDSOI) technologies for sensing applications. After a description of pH sensors (ISFETs) integrated on industrial 28 nm FDSOI CMOS platform using ALD deposited aluminum oxide as sensing layers [3], we will present recent advances on sensing materials for environmental sensors for air and water quality monitoring. For air quality monitoring, we present sensing properties at very low temperatures (< 50 °C) of metal oxides (SnO₂) and hybrid polymers (PEI + SiO₂ NPs) for NO₂ and CO₂ detection respectively. For water quality monitoring we present a technological approach for the fabrication of ion sensing membranes (ISM) selective to nitrates (NO₃⁻) ions polluting ionic species.
