01 Inhomogeneous metal deposition/Lithium dendrites growth

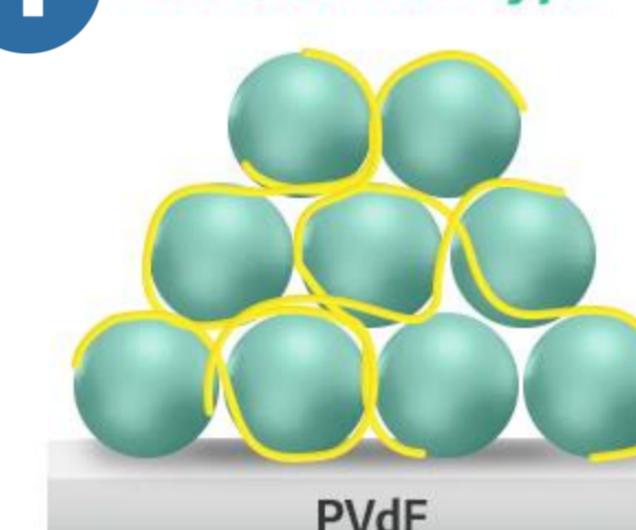
Interfaces issues (formation of blocking interface, chemical interfacial energy, parasitic reaction, incompatibility with active materials, etc.)

Mechanical (contact loss, fracture, poor solid-solid contact) and electrochemical (interface reaction) stability upon cycling

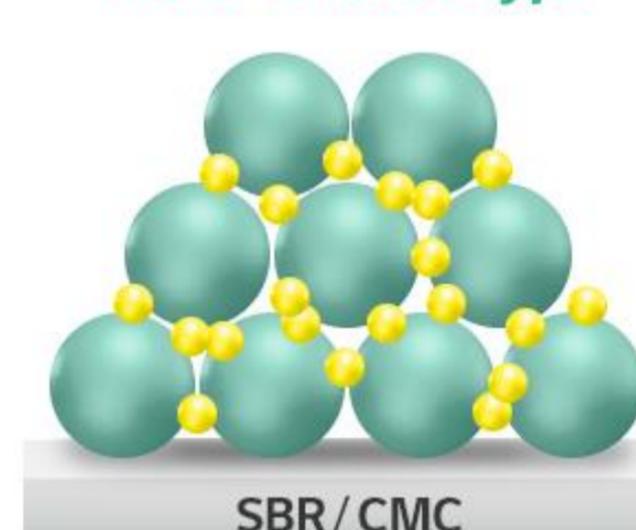
Polymer application in batteries

Polymer as soft material has been used widely in battery field, including:

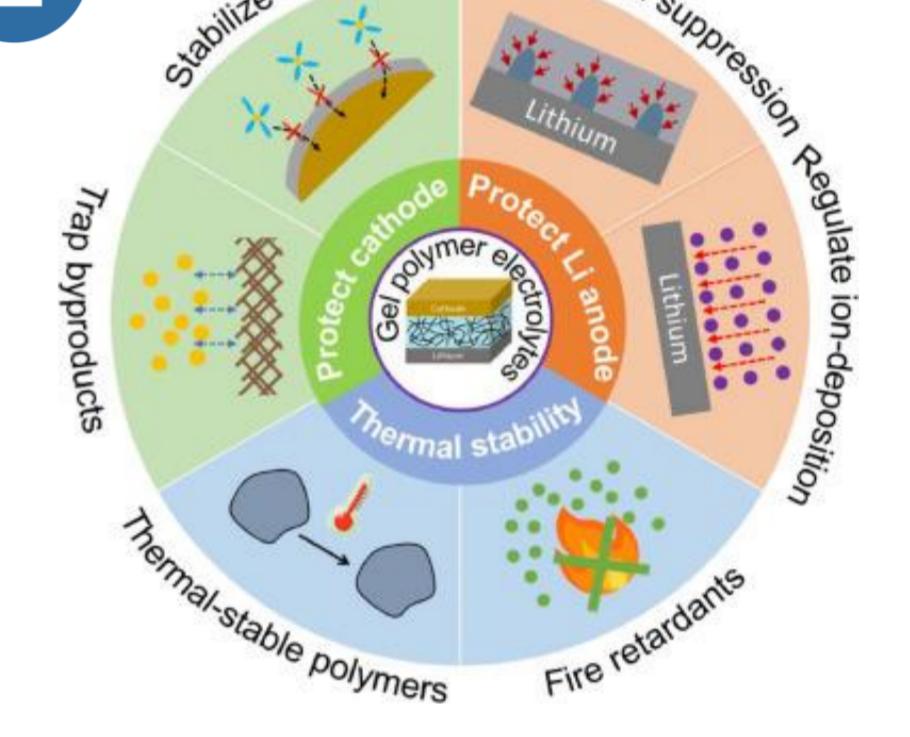

Point-contact type

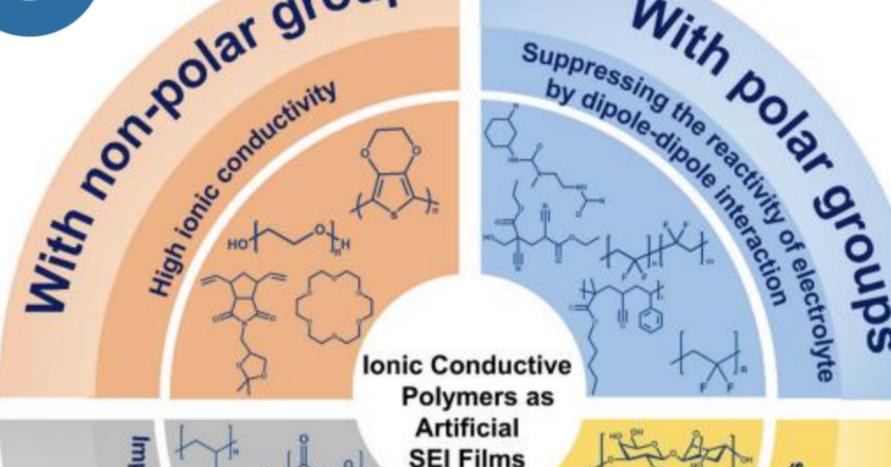

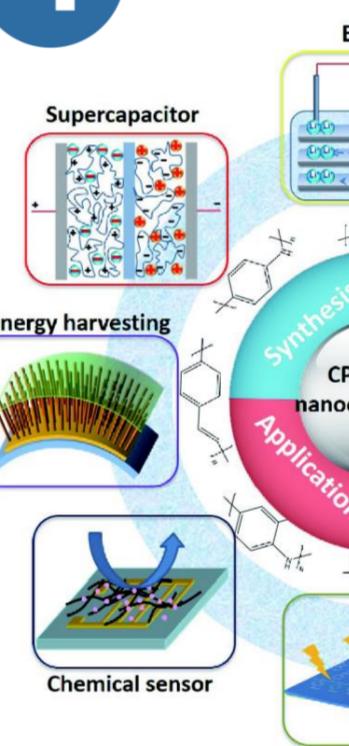

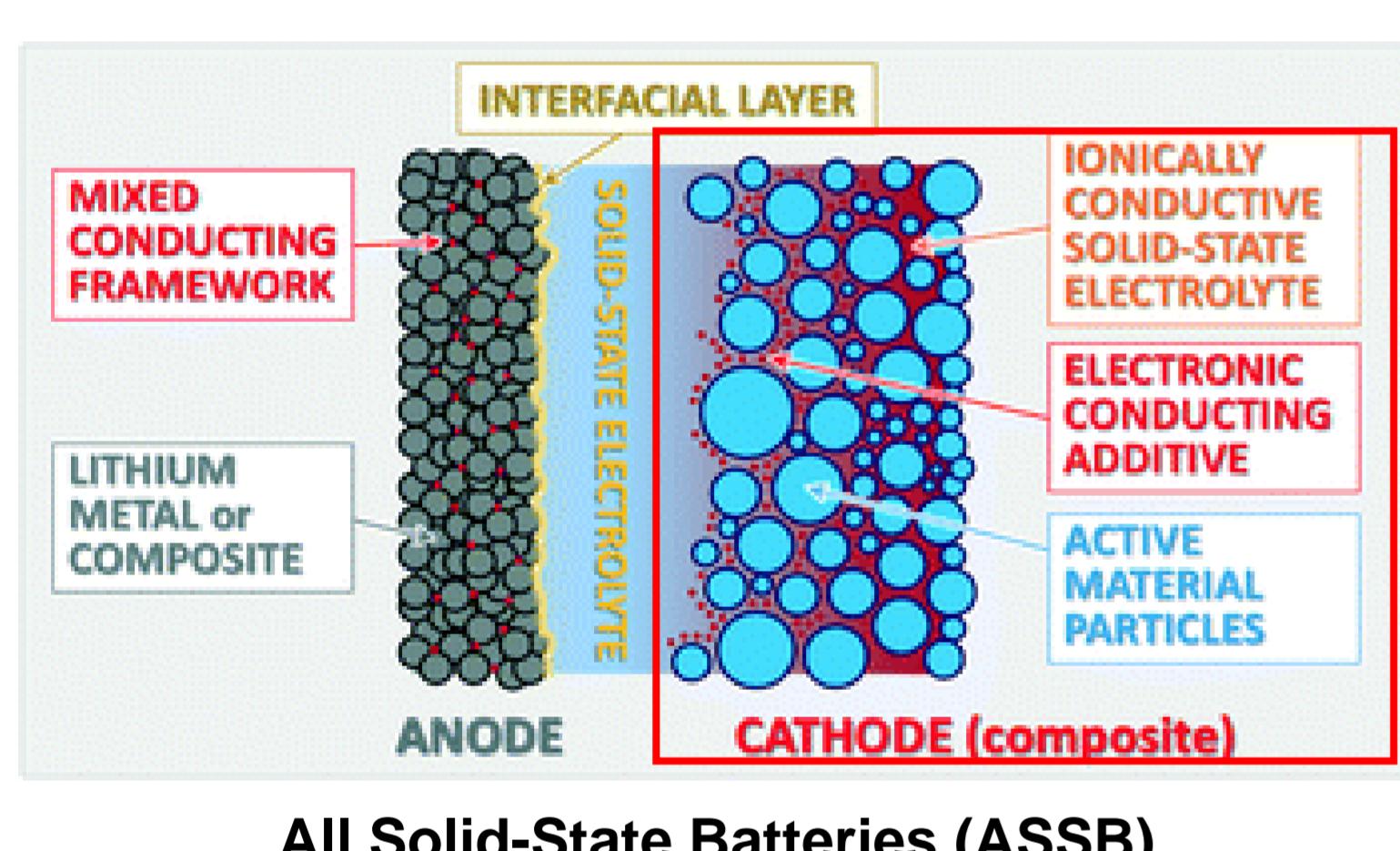

Conducting polymer as storage medium etc.

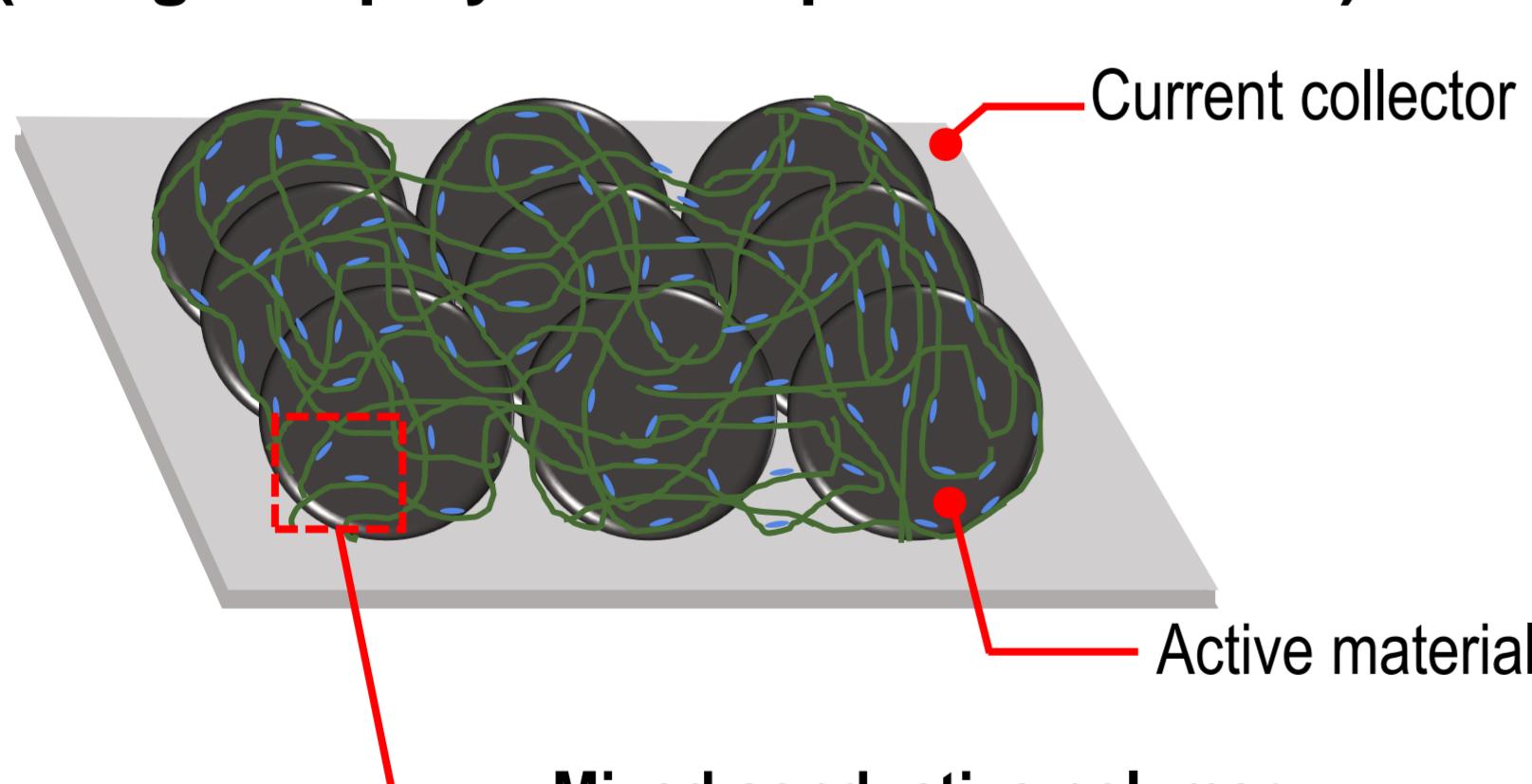
Positive electrode in ASSB



- Concerns are mainly on the **interface issues**, **structure integrity**, and the needs of adequate **ionic and electronic conductive** materials
- Currently, up to **50 w.t.% solid electrolyte** and **carbon additive** are added to the positive electrode, **decreasing the energy and power density** of the overall SSB

Goals of the project

Positive Electrodes (Inorganic-polymer composite materials)



- Develop a polymer that will simultaneously act as the binder, the conductive additive (electron conductor) and also the catholyte (Li^+ ion conductor) in the positive electrode.
- Polymer is expected to bring plasticity and promote the solid-solid interface between positive electrode and the electrolyte in ASSB and buffer the impact of volume change upon cycling.
- Furthermore, polymer will enhance and stabilize the formation of solid electrolyte – cathode (CEI) interface.
- Design a polymer that is applicable for a wide range of positive electrode active materials as well as solid electrolytes
