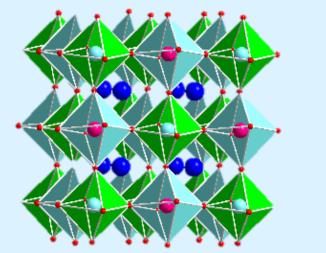

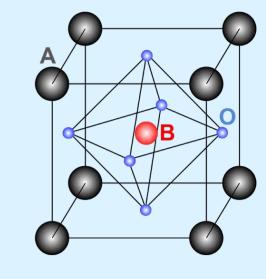

## Background

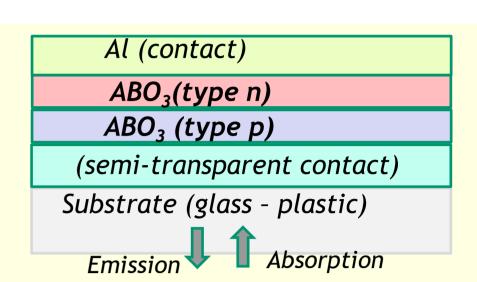
- Perovskite named after the Russian mineralogist L. A.Perovski, their simple and flexible structure: ABO3 fits to be doped with elements from all the periodic table
- The Perovskite film has a crystalline structure. Many different materials are being developed and gradually adopted for highperformance perovskite solar cells (Rapid increase in efficiency; from 3,8% in 2009 to 25% in 2020 and 30% in 2022)
- Low production cost and simple and scalable manufacturing





#### Abstract

The objective of this work is the realization of an opto-electronic component (pn junction) based on doped metal oxide semiconductors (SrSnO<sub>3</sub>:Sb@SrSnO<sub>3</sub>:Al) synthesized in an eco-environmental framework of sustainable development. The project goes from the low cost, simple and scalable synthesis of the materials (e.g., sol-gel process), to their application as light absorbers or barrier layers in highly efficient solar cells. Other applications are also possible (e.g., LEDs).)

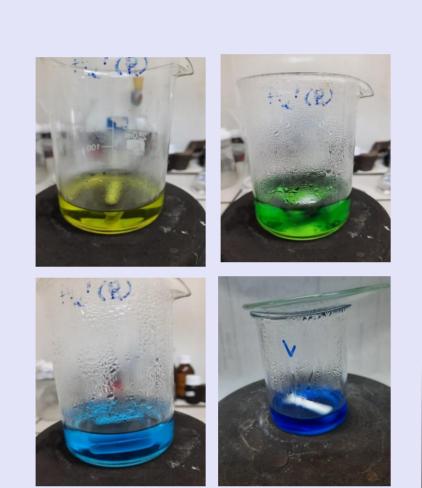


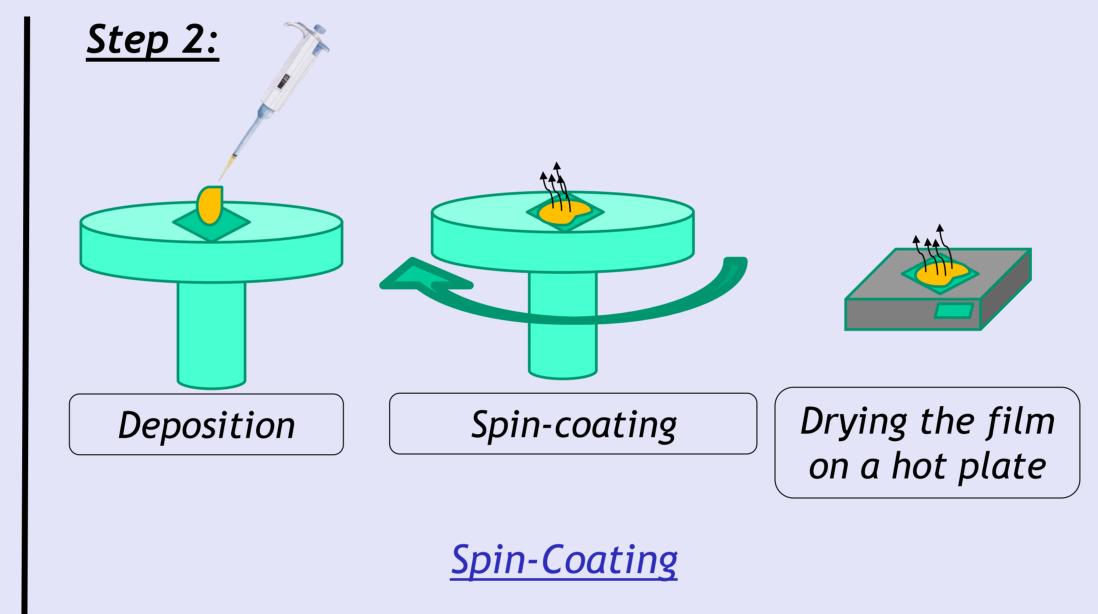
# Experimental

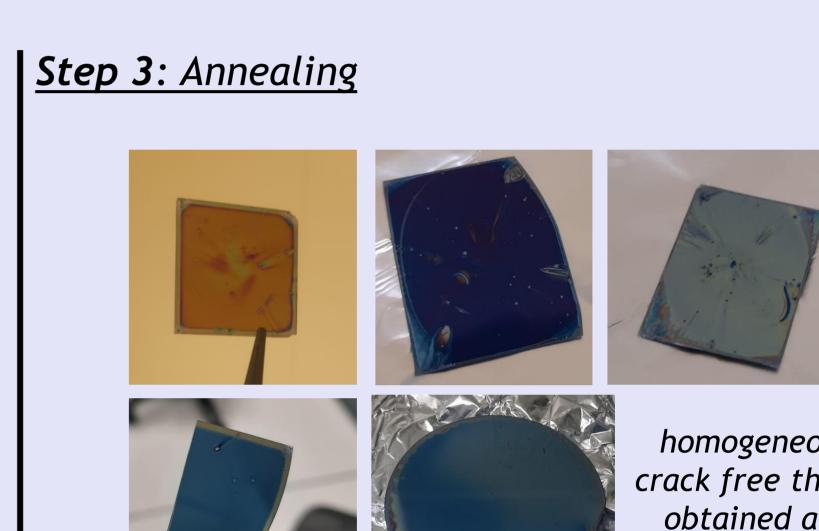
### First method: Chemical solution deposition (CSD)

#### **Step 1:** Synthesis process

This method consists in chelating metallic cations with citric acid in an aqueous solution. Then metal citrates polymerize with ethylene glycol by increasing the temperature.

## Second method: Physical Vapor Deposition



Step 1: Preparing the powder with sol gel synthesis method

Step 2: Pressing the powder on a target using a hydrolic press

### XRD measurement (CSD)

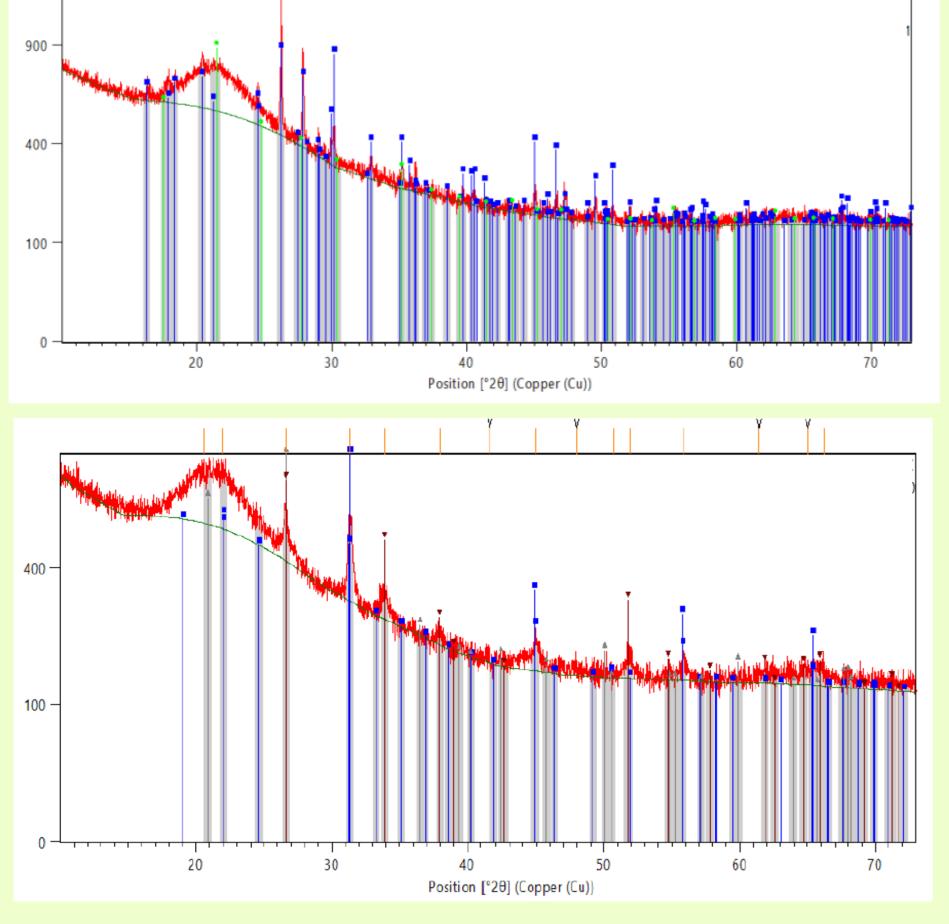


Figure: XRD diffractograms plotted on highscore to verify the cristallinity and the chemical composition of CSD prepared samples.

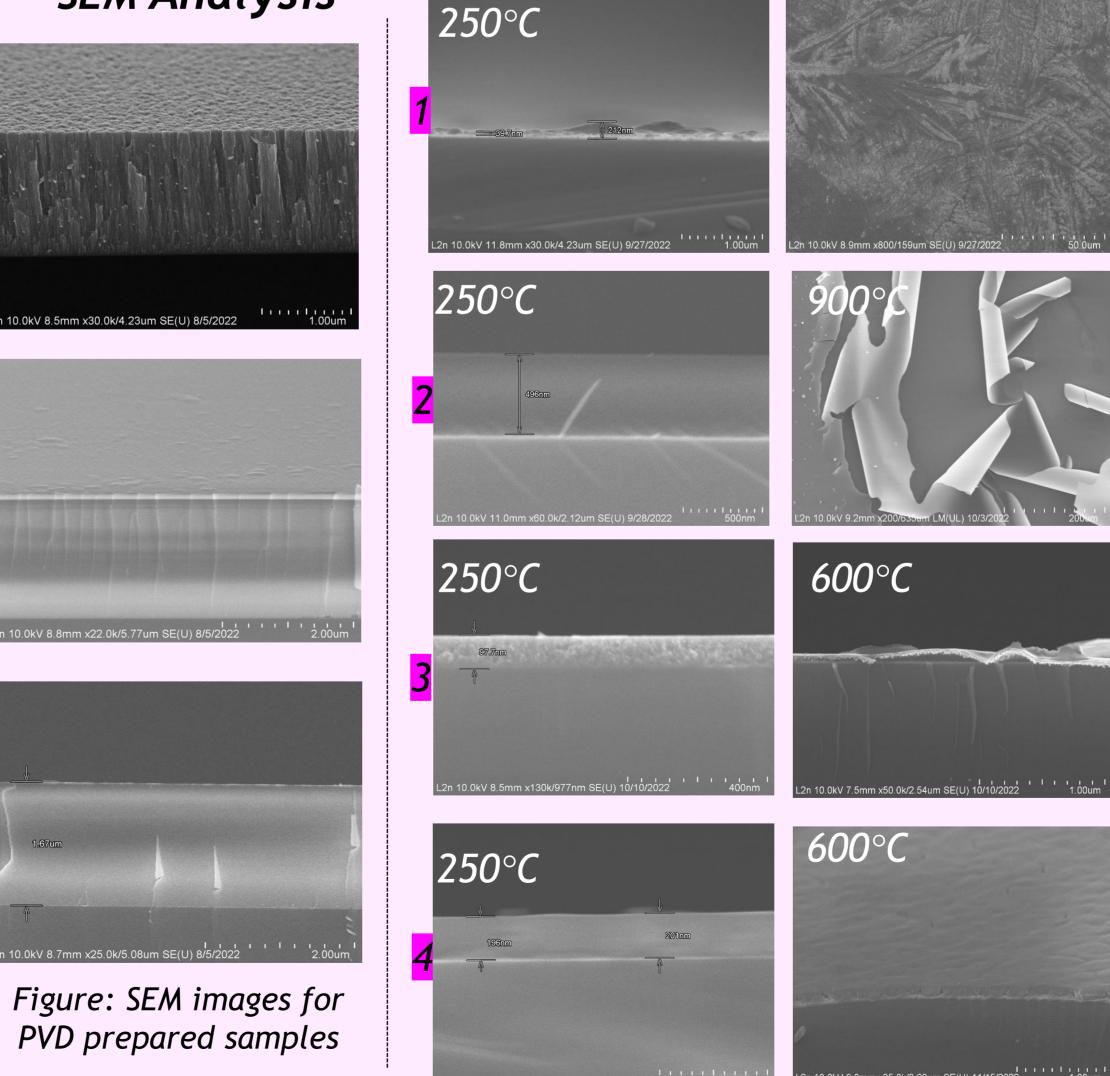
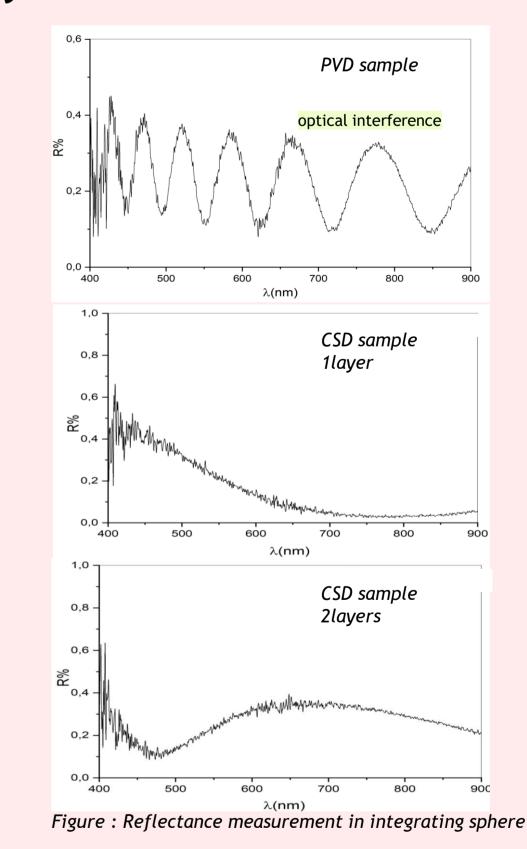


Figure: SEM images for CSD samples prepared in diffrerent conditions

# Reflectance measurements



#### r: reflection and t: transmission The incident beam encounters a first interface (air/material boundary). The

change in refractive index divides the beam into two parts :reflected and substrate

transmitted. D: diffusion Reflection R and transmission T: the light beam then undergoes a series of multiple transmissions and reflections,

leading to the phenomenon of optical interference.

# Conclusion

- For CSD prepared thin films, many parameters are crucial: annealing T°C, precursors, pH, etc. A deep study had to be done to find the right conditions to have the appropriate thickness and homogeniety.
- -Structure has been confirmed, in principle, with XRD diffraction and highscore software.
- -SEM images proves the final aspect of homogeneous, uniform and crack free films.
- -Reflectance measurement reflects the presence of optical interference phenomenon.

-Electrical and mechanical characterisation -Make multilayers for pn junction and fabricate the first device
