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Characterization of children with Specific learning disorders and sleep complaints

INTRODUCTION

Specific learning disorders (SLD) is reported in 8 to 10% of the general pediatric population. This condition is often associated with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) (33 to 70%) [1]. These neurodevelopmental disorders are commonly associated with sleep difficulties [2, 3]. Previous studies, based on questionnaires, showed that SLD is associated with more frequent sleep troubles, especially in children with SLD and ADHD [4, 5].

OBJECTIVES

The aims of this study were :

1) to evaluate clinical characteristics and sleep complaints of children with SLD, ADHD or both addressed to the pediatric sleep labs.

2) to evaluate sleep characteristics of polysomnographic recordings in children with SLD, ADHD or both.

3) to evaluate the impact of stimulant medications on sleep complaints and sleep quality

METHODS

One hundred and seventeen patients (5-18 y.o.), with SLD, ADHD or both, having completed a sleep assessment between 2015 and 2024 in *Lyon and **Dijon. Exclusion criteria : Opposition to clinical data use.

Children SLD with ADHD had higher % of stimulant medications than ADHD and SLD (*p* <0.001).

ADHD children exhibited more history of respiratory disorders (p = 0.02), mood disorders (p = 0.01) and HIP (p = 0.01) than SLD and SLD/ADHD. SLD/ADHD children had

This study showed that 30 to 40% of children with SLD with or without ADHD had complaints of [1] Mayes S et al. JPedPsy. 2008 [2] Margagi L et al. BMC Neurology. 2013 sleepiness. These children showed a high % of mild OSA and PLM. They had also a significant proportion of sleep fragmentation probably of multifactorial origins (respiratory disorders, ADOLESC. PSYCHIATRY. 2009 stimulant therapy or anxiety-depressive feelings). Futher study with more patients is underway.
