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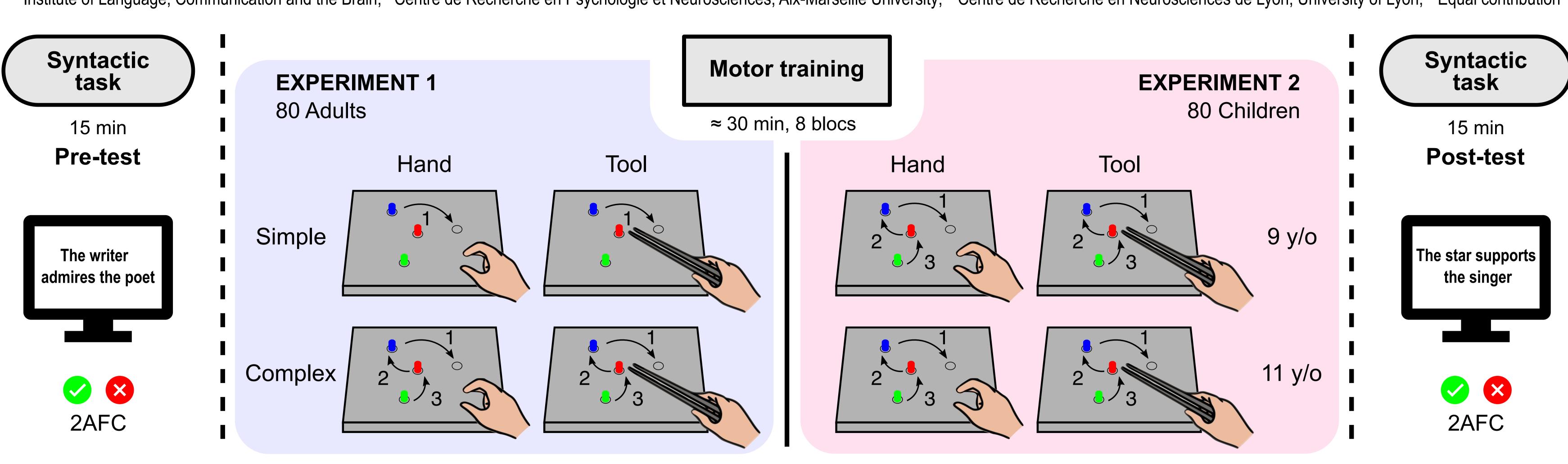


Domain-general syntax

The crucial role of tool-use motor training to improve syntactic comprehension in language, in adults and children

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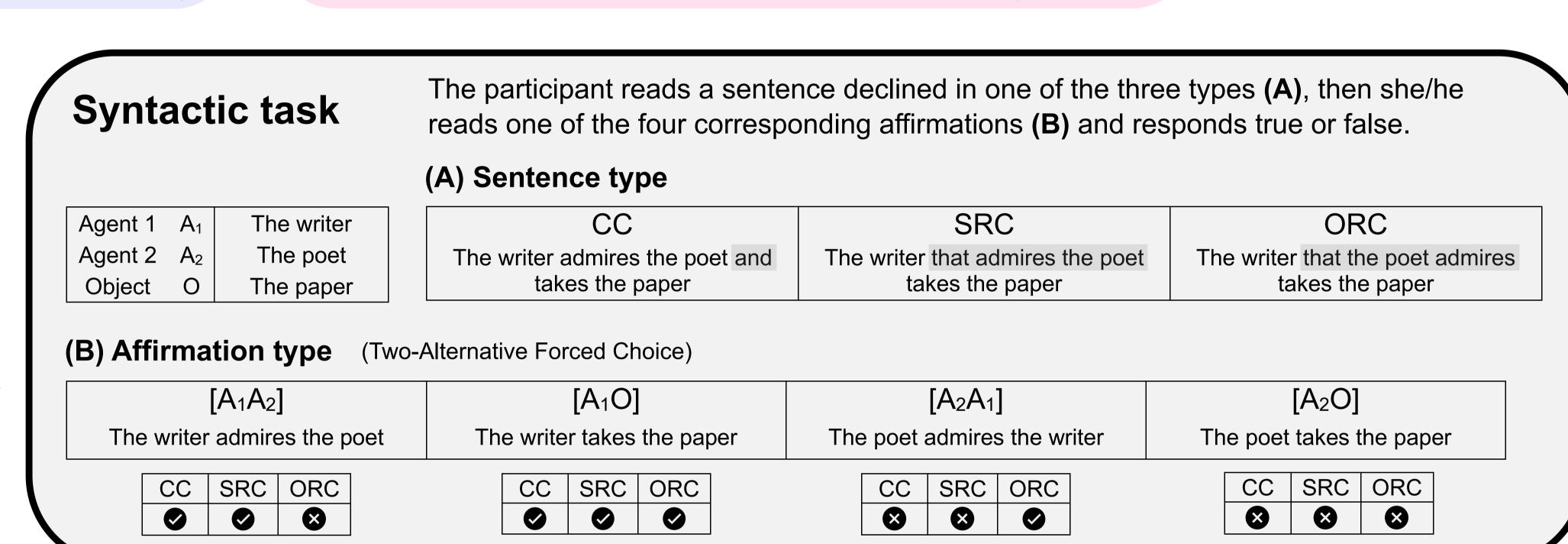


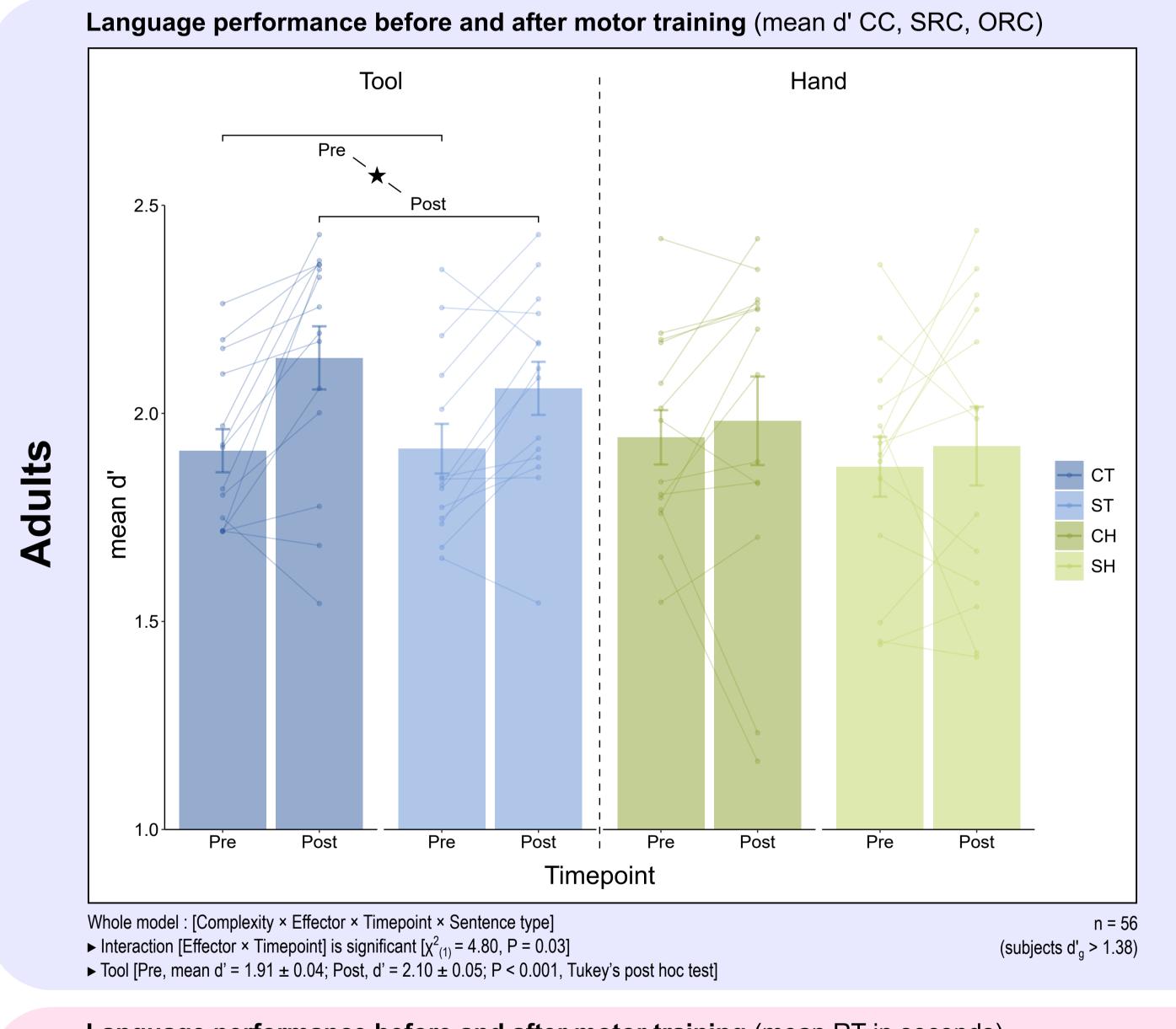
A domain-general syntax may support language and motor skills:

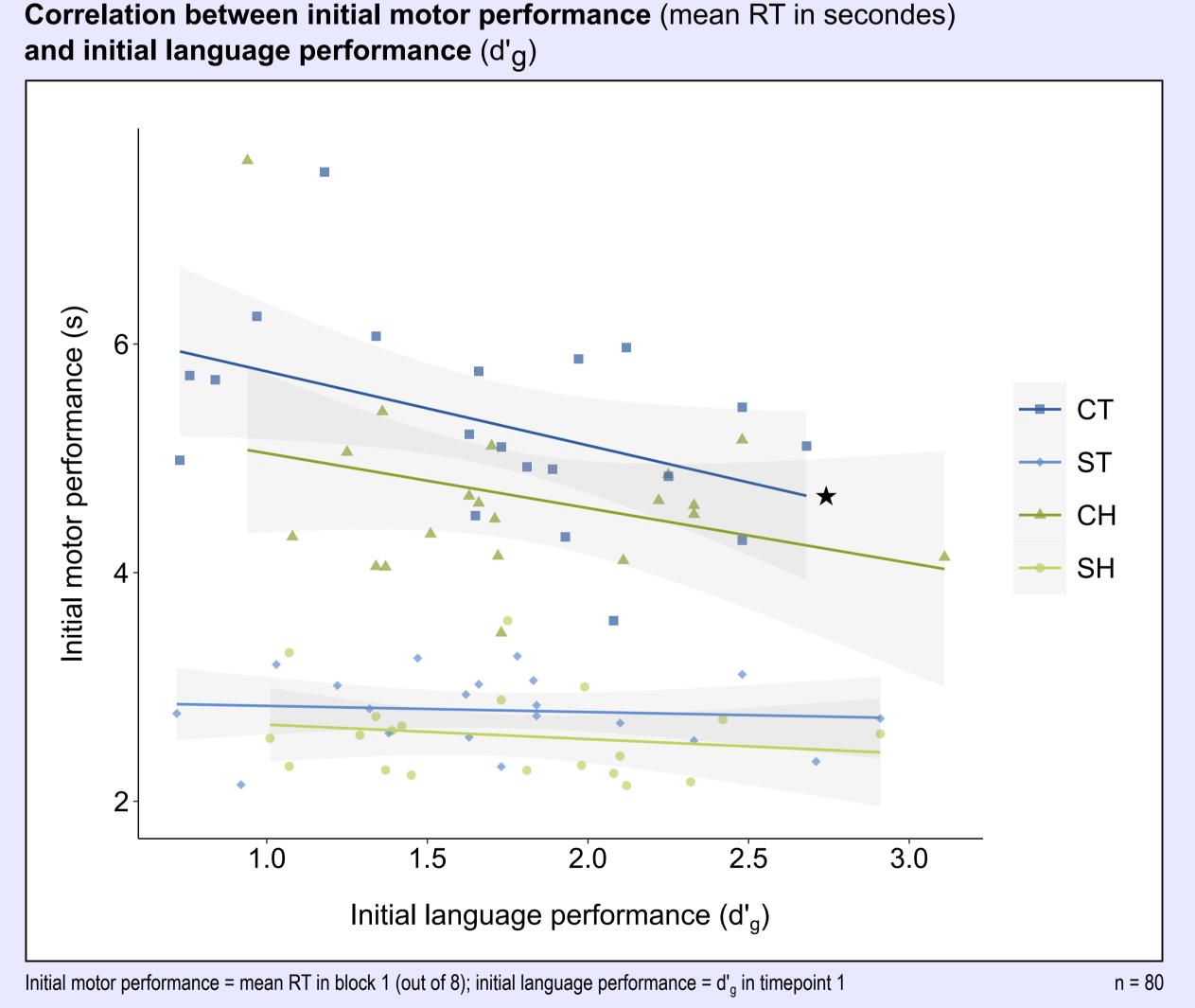
- The syntactic components of the two domains share common brain substrate.
- Processing of language syntax improves after motor training with a tool.

We aimed to qualify more precisely what aspects of this motor training can promote such learning transfer:

- Experiment 1 was designed to disentangle the role of the Effector from the role of the Action Complexity.
- Experiment 2 aimed to investigate whether this learning is present in children before or after syntactic skills reach maturity, namely at 9 vs 11 years of age.







Faster performance in the tool-use motor task correlated to better linguistic syntax performance.

Correlation between motor improvement (Δ % correct)

ightharpoonup [CT: r(18) = -0.44, p = 0.02]

- Language syntax performance was improved after tool use training, regardless of the level of Action Complexity.
- No effect was observed after barehand training.
- Before any training, syntactic abilities in language can be predicted by initial motor dexterity for performing complex actions with a tool.

Language improvement (Δ % correct)

Motor improvement = Δ % correct_(block 8 - block 1); language improvement = Δ % correct_(timepoint 2 - timepoint 1)

A stronger improvement in the tool-use motor task correlated to a stronger improvement in the language syntax task.

 Language syntax performance was improved after complex tool use training, regardless of the age.

CT = Complex Tool, ST = Simple Tool, CH = Complex Hand, SH = Simple Hand

- No effect was observed after barehand training.
- The participants' ability to progress in the complex motor task with a tool correlated with their ability to progress in the language task.

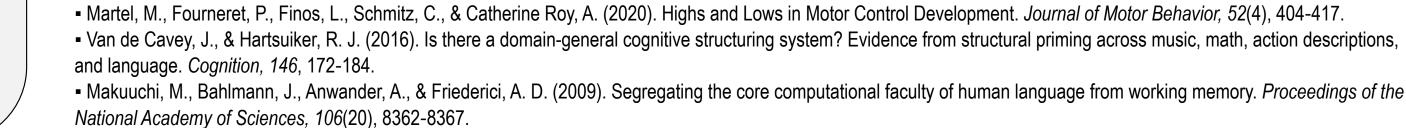
We obtained a learning transfer from the motor to the language task in the tool-use conditions. Children from 9 to 11 seemed to benefit from this learning transfer.

Altogether, our results are in line with the idea of common domain-general syntactic processes.

Whole model: [Effector × Age × Timepoint × Sentence type]

► Interaction [Effector × Timepoint] is significant [$\chi^2_{(1)}$ = 8.06, P = 0.005]

► Tool [Pre, mean RT = 2.65 ± 0.09 ; Post, RT = 2.34 ± 0.10 ; P < 0.001, Tukey's post hoc test]
