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
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What are plastics?

The term "plastics" includes materials composed of various elements such as carbon, hydrogen, oxygen, nitrogen, chlorine, and sulphur. Plastics typically have high molecular weight. Also called polymers, they are produced by the conversion of natural products or by the synthesis from primary chemicals generally coming from oil, natural gas, or coal.

Polyethylene **Terephthalate**

Commonly found in plastic water/soda bottles and some food packaging.





HDPE

High Density Polyethylene

Opaque plastic found in milk jugs and detergent, cosmetics or household cleaner bottles.





OTHER PATCHES

Garbage patches are formed by rotating ocean currents called *gyres*. Along with the "Great Pacific garbage patch", four more patches have been identified: one in the South Pacific Ocean, two in the Atlantic Ocean and one in the Indian Ocean.

Microplastics



They are tiny plastic particles which are less than five millimeters in diameter. There are two categories: (1) primary microplastics and (2) secondary microplastics.

THE CHALLENGE OF RECYCLING

Globally, 18 percent of plastic is recycled, up from nearly zero in 1980. Plastic bottles are one of the most widely recycled products. But other items, such as drinking straws, are harder to recycle and often discarded.







Bamboo is the world's fastest growing plant!










Other alternatives to singleuse plastics

NB: not all bioplastics are biodegradable!






Bioplastics, also called "biologically based polymers", are plastics created from renewable natural sources.
